

THE KAISER BEHIND

HIS SCHEDULE

Paris, Aug. 13.—Commenting on the schedule found on German prisoners, showing that they are expected to reach Lille on Aug. 5, and Paris on Aug. 11, the Matin says that one letter was discovered which refers to an invitation by Emperor William to his staff to dine tonight (Aug. 13), at a well known Paris restaurant. The Matin adds: "We are afraid the dinner will be cold before they get here."

The Matin further emphasizes German miscalculations by giving details of the heroic conduct of Belgians on the battlefield. It emphasizes Trooper Bogarets, of the Third Lancers, who has already personally captured fourteen prisoners and killed three Uhlans, being himself unwounded.

At Tirelemont, a Belgian gendarm alone captured three dismounted Uhlans who, dropping their carbines, surrendered. The majority of German prisoners immediately demanded food, admitting that the commissariat service is very faulty.

ARTILLERY GO FIRST

Ottawa, Aug. 12.—Canadian troops in Canada's expeditionary army who go to the front will all be provided with the mark three Canadian Ross Rifle, declared by military experts here to be the latest and best military arm in the world. The department has enough of these rifles now available to give to each one of the twenty-five thousand men who will be assembled at Valcartier. Military units which have not already been supplied with this latest government rifle will be furnished with it on arrival at Valcartier.

Rush orders for additional rifles have been placed with the Ross Rifle Company, and in the event of a second or even third contingent, being sent abroad, there will be a sufficient supply on hand to meet all needs.

According to the reports of the enrolling officers throughout Canada, western Canada seems to be setting the pace for the rest of the dominion and the type of men who are offering are of the very best. It is probable that the number to be taken from western Canada will be somewhat larger than was originally intended.

The troops are to be given clothing, and equipment for a campaign of at least five or six months, and winter clothing will be sent along with the transports.

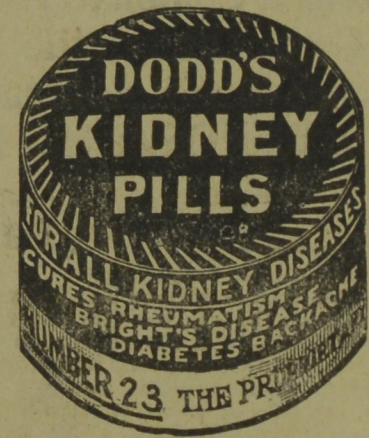
FORMALITY.

AMPHION'S CRUISE

SHORT BUT LIVELY

London, Aug. 10.—A Harwich despatch says that the survivors of the British cruiser Amphion, which was blown up by a German mine, say that hardly had the ship left Harwich when they were ordered to clear the decks for action. They had sighted the Koenigin Luise, the mine-laying ship, and, as she refused to stop, even when a shot was fired across her bows they gave chase. The German ship fired and then the destroyers surrounded her and sank her after a brief combined bombardment.

The captain of the Koenigin Luise was beside himself with fury. He had a revolver in his hand and threatened his men as they prepared to surrender to the rescuing ships. He flatly refused to give himself up and was taken by force. He could not control himself and as he was being taken away from here to the military prison he flung his bundle into the picket boat with a gesture of angry defiance. His men, on the contrary, appeared to be quite contented and laughed, chatted and smoked whenever they got a chance and betrayed eager interest in all things English.

THE AMPHION OFF AGAIN.

Then the smoke of a big ship was seen on the horizon and the Amphion gave chase, firing a warning shot as she drew near the vessel, which made known her identity as the Harwich boat, St. Petersburg, carrying Prince Lichnowsky, the German ambassador, to the Hook, Holland.

While returning to port came the tragedy to the Amphion. As she struck the sunken mine she gave two plunging jerks, then came an explosion which ripped up her fore-part, shot up her funnels like arrows from a bow and lifted her heavy guns into the air. The falling material struck several of the boats of the flotilla and injured some of the men aboard them. The Amphion's survivors are dreadfully burned and scalded and have marks on their faces and bodies which resemble splashes of acid.

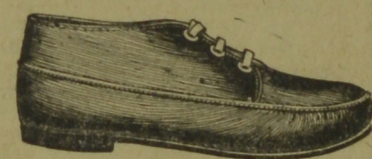
