THE MID-WEEK MARKET.

There was an exceptionally large mid-week market this morning. Eggs were in abundance and sold at from 28 to 30 cents per dozen, while butter was selling at from 23 to 25 cents per pound. Potatoes brought from 40 to 50 cents per half barrel and apples sold at from \$1 to \$1.50 per barrel. Chickens were quite plentiful and sold at from 75 cents to \$1.25 per pair, while ducks brought from \$1.50 to \$1.65 per pair.

FIRE AT YORK MILLS.

The dwelling house and barn owned by Mr. Roy Little of York Mills, was totally destroyed by fire on Sunday evening. The fire, it is believed, came from a defective chimney and caught rapidly. ARBITRATION PROCEEDINGS TO LAST SEVERAL DAYS

Arbitrators Will Likely Make an Inspection of the Road Between This City and Woodstock--Large Sum Claimed by Hibbard Co.

The arbitration proceedings to adjust a dispute between the Hibbard Construction Company and the St. John and Quebec Railway Company, will likely be continued for several days. A large sum is being claimed by the Hibbard Company for work done on the section of the road between Fredericton and Woodstock, and most of the sub-contractors who worked under this concern have a financial interest in the outcome. It is likely that the arbitrators will make a trip over the road to personally inspect the character of the work. Mr. A. J. Gregory, K.C., is acting as counsel for the Hibbard Company, and Mr. R. B. Hanson is looking after the interests of the St. John and Quebec Railway Company.

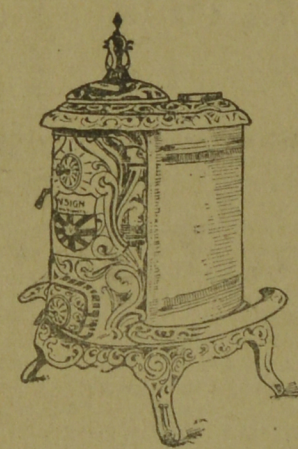
