#### LEGAL ACTION

### THREATENED BY FEDERALS OVER KILLIFER

Legality of Reserve Clause Will be  
Point---Killifer Signed Again With  
Philadelphia Nationals

Chicago, Jan. 21—The decisive battle of the baseball war of 1914 may be fought in a Federal Court. This was intimated today by persons close to the promoters of the Federal League, who served notice that they would fight any attempt, of clubs in "organized ball" to sign their players.

The legality of the reserve clause in the contracts of National and American Leagues will be the point over which the battle will rage, but when or where the contest will start was not made public. After delivering a challenge to organized ball, declaring the Federal League would "protect" its players and their contracts, Pres. Gilmore of the new organization disappeared today, and therefore definite plans for the conflict have not become generally known.

The announcement of the signing of William Killifer by the Philadelphia Nationals was made so soon after Gilmore had warned the Quaker City Club that the Federals would fight if Killifer and Brennan were signed with it, that it looked to the Gilmore cohorts like the formal picking up of the gauntlet.

Federal Leaguers declared themselves so confident that the reserve clause will be held illegal, that they predicted tonight a grand scramble for signed ball players as soon as a court decision is made.

"If it comes to bidding for players we will be as strong as anybody," said Charles Weckman, president of the Chicago Federals.

"Organized ball knows it has no legal right to sign our ball players," said Manager Tinker of the local club. "It merely wants to tie them up so they can't play with us."

Neither Weckman nor Tinker would say whether court action would precede or follow actual participation in games by Killifer.

In addition to other players who visited Federal League headquarters, Alex Zwilling, purchased from St. Joseph by the Boston Nationals, talked with the manager of the new league today.

#### SIGNED WITH PHILLIES

Philadelphia, Jan. 21—William Killifer, the catcher who was reported to have signed with the Federals last night, signed a three-year contract with the Philadelphia National League Club, according to a statement given out this afternoon by Pres. Baker of the local organization.

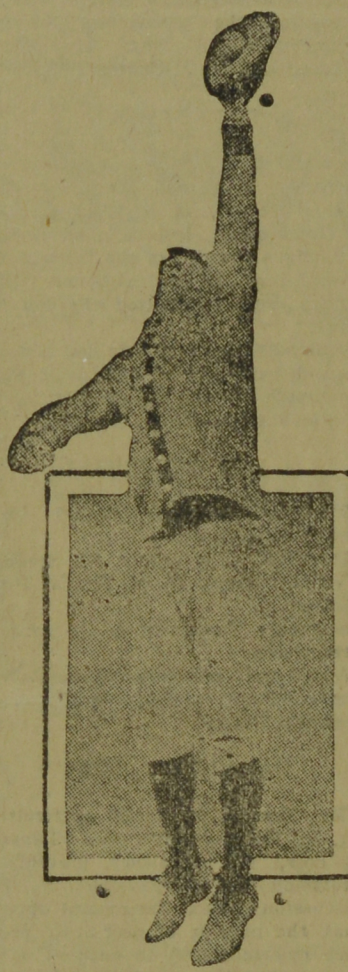

#### ENERGY IN COAL

Work Done by Men or Horses is  
Little in Comparison

Does any one realize the power of coal as a worker? A man was set to work to pump as hard as he could all day, and at the end of 10 hours it was found that he had done just as much work as a little less than two ounces of coal could do.

Taking all the energy put forth by a hard-working man during one whole year, the same amount of force would be furnished by 36 pounds of good coal, or say 40 pounds of average coal.

Of course, even in our best engines the greater part of the working energy of coal is wasted. But even if only one-tenth is turned to account, one and a half hundredweight of coal is equal to a man working for 300 days of the year.

A horse can do as much work as 10 men, but one and a quarter pounds of coal has as much force as a horse expends in one day. So that, a ton of coal, if we could use all its force, would do as much work as six horses working for a whole year.

## HON. ROBERT ROGERS MAY SUCCEED STRATHCONA

Ottawa, Jan. 21—There is a well defined rumor in parliamentary circles here tonight that the successor to Lord Strathcona as Canadian high commissioner at London will be the Hon. Robert Rogers.

It is stated by those who are usually in close touch with the minister of public works that he is desirous of crowning his public career by going to London as Canada's representative rather than by remaining here on the chance that he might succeed to the premiership when Mr. Borden retires.

There is, of course, a chance that Mr. Rogers, at present the real boss of the Conservative party, might have the opportunity to grasp the mantle now worn by Premier Borden when the latter gladly puts it off. But Mr. Rogers realizes that there will be much opposition to installing him as the titular, as well as the real leader of the government, and coming disclosures may seriously jeopardize his chances. At the present moment he is said to be heading for the high commissionership and if he has made up his mind to it, the chances are that he can compel Mr. Borden to consent to his appointment, despite the claims of others to whom the premiership is beholden.

Hon. J. D. Hazen is also mentioned in the well informed circles, as being a candidate for the position, but Mr. Rogers has undoubtedly the strongest pull with the government supporters.

Hon. Mr. Perley, as Mr. Borden's oldest and closest confidant in the cabinet, would naturally have first choice, if the premier had his way, but Mr. Perley will not embarrass Mr. Borden by pressing his claims if there are rival aspirants and in any case it is doubtful if he would care to accept the position.

Another name prominently mentioned for the high commissionership is that of Hon. Adam Beck, who is now en route from London, and who would be generally acceptable to the non-wire pulling element of the party and to the country at large. Mr. Beck would probably accept the position if it were offered to him. Just at present he is being boosted for the Ontario premiership in opposition to Hon. W. J. Horne. The rival claims of these two to succeed Sir James Whitney are well recognized by Premier Borden and the selection of either would likely result in friction

and embarrassment for the party in Ontario.

#### BECK, A LIKELY MAN.

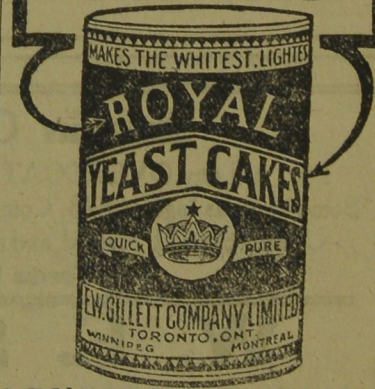
Apart altogether from Mr. Beck's fitness for the high commissionership his appointment thereto might relieve the political tension in the provincial capital and pave the way for Mr. Hanna's succession to the premiership without involving any family rows in the provincial Conservative camp. For this reason there may be considerable pressure brought to bear on Premier Borden to offer the post to Mr. Beck in order to straighten out the Ontario end of the party's political troubles.

Whether in view of the provincial complications from the party standpoint, Mr. Rogers can be induced to step aside and make his own ambitions subservient to the party welfare, remains to be seen.

Another keen aspirant for the position is said to be Sir Hugh Graham of Montreal. Under the circumstances, however, it is doubtful if his claim bears much weight against the political considerations and influences above noted.

In view of the complications and difficulties of the situation for Mr. Borden, it is hardly to be expected that he will be able to reach any decision for some time to come. The position may remain open until the conclusion of the present session of parliament, when a general cabinet reconstruction is contemplated.
