"We should make our tariffs not like those who dole out favors, but like those who serve a nation," were the words of a great man and I commend them to the consideration of this House and of the people of Canada whose interests we are called on to safeguard."

TORIES ARE LOYAL

(Continued from Page One.)

"Yes, per barrel," replied Mr. Foster.

Mr. MacLean was not satisfied, however, and suggested again that the minister was incorrect in saying that the prices quoted were prices per barrel.

Joining in the discussion, Sir Wilfrid quoted figures obtained for him by what he termed from a reliable authority which showed that the London prices in April, 1912, 1913 and 1914 were from thirty cents to a dollar below the price for the same flour in Canadian cities.

Premier Borden reminded the House that the millers who had interviewed the government a short time ago had given assurance that Canadian prices were not higher than those charged in Britain.

Mr. Foster admitted that the prices he had read were reduced to the 280 pounds basis rather than the barrel basis. On the barrel basis the price would be \$4.80.

DR. MICHAEL CLARK.

Resuming the debate after recess, Dr. Clark opened, amid applause and laughter, by referring to Mr. Foster's confession that he had been at sea for two and a half years.

"I'm afraid he's still at sea," observed the Red Deer man.

In a key of shrill fatsetto, Mr. Foster had assured parliament that all this period of hard times would come out right in the end. Canada was just sleeping and would awake refreshed and reinvigorated from her slumber.

"It's not Canada that is asleep; it is this government," declared Dr. Clark, amid renewed laughter.

Mr. White, on the other hand, had talked fearfully about economic cycles and declared that the existent times of stress were world-wide.

"Not so," declared Dr. Clark. "Official figures show us that while trade is shrinking in Canada, it is expanding under the Wilson-Underwood tariff in the United States, while Britain is undergoing one of the most prosperous periods in her great career."

"The worst friends of the empire, Dr. Clark said, are those who base the imperial connection with the wrong foundation. If trade with the United States will annex us to that country, then we are annexed already."

McLean of Colborne, called to investigate the protest filed against the return of John Lawlor, Jr., and Arch Murchie as councillors for the parish of Durham, resulted in two Conservative councillors being unseated for bribery and corruption.

The whole Tory machine was put in motion here to save the two councillors, who are officials of the provincial government, both being scalars. A new election will be held in Durham soon.

Ottawa, April 23—A little girl of four, daughter of Gillett Pettiters, postman was practically boiled to death in a few minutes yesterday afternoon. She walked backwards into a tank of boiling water.
