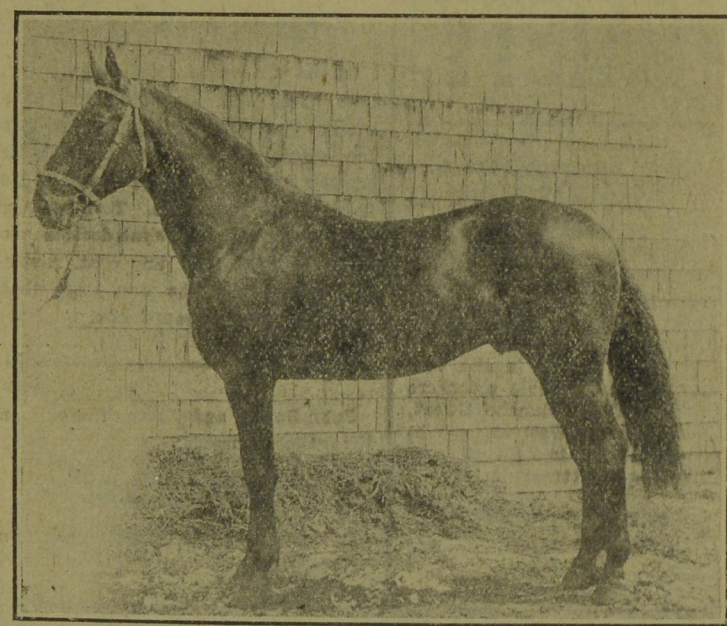

TRUESDALE TO
PLAY SECOND BASE
FOR HIGHLANDERS

Gilhooley Sold by Montreal for Ten
Thousand Traded to Buffalo -
Truesdale Replaces Hartzell

New York, April 22—Frank Gilhooley, the outfielder purchased from Montreal last season by Manager Chance of the New York Americans, is to be traded to Buffalo for Frank Truesdale, a second baseman. Waivers were asked on Gilhooley yesterday and he will go to Buffalo as soon as all of the clubs give their consent.

Truesdale probably will play second for the Yankees in the place of Hartzell. He will report to Chance immediately.

Gilhooley was purchased from Montreal for a sum said to have been \$10,000, but the amount was not to be paid until he had made good. Whether the purchase price is to be paid now has not yet been made known by Manager Chance or the officials of the Montreal club.

One of Foremost Long-Distance Events of the Season—Great Team of Oxford Runners the Feature of the Race—College Athletes From all Over the United States Will Take Part

Philadelphia, Pa., April 24—Franklin Field will tomorrow be the centre of attraction for track and field athletic enthusiasts on both sides of the Atlantic. The occasion will be the twentieth annual carnival of the relay races and field sports under the University of Pennsylvania auspices, and which this year has been given added interest by the entry of a team representing Oxford University, England.

The Oxford team will participate in the four-mile relay race for the championship of the world. Against them will run the pick of the four mile teams of American universities, and, in view of the records of the visitors, a new mark for the distance may confidently be expected.

Ten American universities and colleges have entered teams to run against the men from across the water. They are the University of Chicago, Harvard University, Cornell University, Ohio State University, University of Pennsylvania, Dartmouth College, Pennsylvania State College, Boston College, Princeton University, and Colgate University.

FRED MCKAY TAKES
ON "CHUBBY" BANKS
TONIGHT AT MONTREAL

Alf Lynch Formerly of St. John Will
Try to do a "Come Back" With
Burns

Montreal, April 23—Fred McKay, the Winnipeg policeman who made short work of George Grundhoven a short time ago, and "Chubby" Banks the big Toronto heavyweight, will furnish the feature bout of the National Sporting Club's boxing bill here tomorrow night. McKay's ability to handle himself is known to the local boxing enthusiasts and the Toronto scrapper has quite a record attached to his name. For three years he held the Canadian amateur heavyweight championship title. In 1912 he secured the verdict over Jack McKay at Detroit in seven rounds by scoring a knockout, while in the same year he also won over McKenzie in Buffalo and fought a draw with Bobby Day. Last year he won from one-round Davis at Buffalo in a ten-round battle and also from Harry Smith in eight rounds.

The second feature bout on the bill for Saturday will be an encounter between Alf Lynch, the local bantamweight who a few years ago was considered one of the best men in his class and "Pinkie" Burns, the New York boy. Lynch is making a determined effort to "come back."

Lynch formerly resided in St. John.

AT SHAKESPEARE'S
BIRTHPLACE

London, April 23—The old-world town of Stratford-on-Avon, the birthplace and burial place of Shakespeare, was gaily decorated today in celebration of the 350th anniversary of the birth of the immortal bard. Hundreds of pilgrims from all over the United Kingdom and from other countries as well visited the town to look upon Anne Hathaway's house and other places connected with the life of Shakespeare. A throng of record-breaking proportions attended the literary exercises and also witnessed the charming ceremony of decorating the poet's grave.
