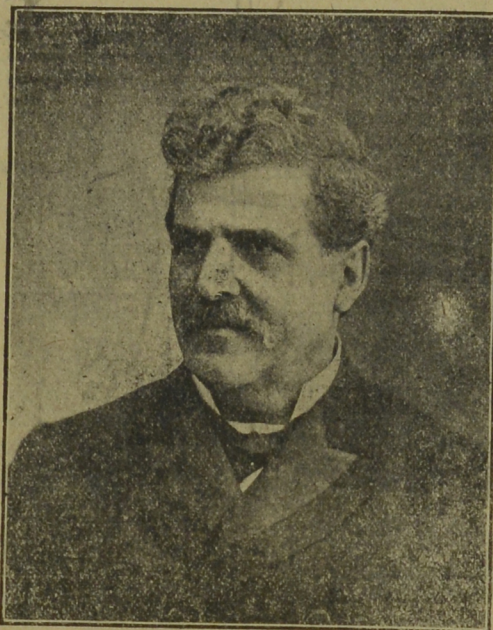

## HON. H. R. EMMERSON'S GREAT SPEECH IN BUDGET DEBATE

have been seen here for many years, but particularly are they in evidence during the present session, in anticipation of securing something in favor of this or that special interest.

## NEEDS OF YOUNG COUNTRY.

"It is argued by the interests that a young country wants protection in order to establish industries and that an old country wants protection continued because to lessen the protection would affect vested interests and so: Protection once established, always established.

"The new doctrine of the protectionist is that the tariff should represent the differences between the cost of production in Canada and the cost of production in other countries, plus a reasonable profit to those who are engaged in the industry. The new part is 'plus a reasonable profit.' Who is to judge as to what that reasonable profit shall be? That policy openly guarantees profits to the men who come and ask favors of the government. As a result of this, men secure from foreign competition, have joined together in great combinations. They have felt the taste of blood and they want more. By reason of these combinations, the cost of living has increased and complaints are heard from the mass of the people who have not heard of the cement trust? Even this government heard of it and took action at a certain time to alleviate the damage that resulted. I have mentioned the other combinations and, of course, each combination must have a compensation which will satisfy it and remove its competitors. The result is that the combination becomes enormous with a very large capitalization on which dividends must be paid. Some body must pay for these dividends and that somebody is the consumer.

## ACTS OF COMBINATIONS.

"When prices are falling, what do these combinations do? They reduce hours of labor; they reduce production; they reduce wages; they throw men out of employment to do what? To keep the prices up in spite of their lack of efficiency; that has been the operation of trusts and combines in the United States and it is the operation and result of trusts and combines in Canada today. The great evil of protection is that it permits; it stimulates this result. We hear much of depression, of men out of employment, of slackness of trade, of mills being closed down, and they are being closed down. In Eastern Canada, in the section of the country from which I come, in Nova Scotia, during the past winter, the wages have been reduced, the number of employees lessened and action taken, all in order that production may be lessened and prices kept up.

"When you buy an imported article you pay part of the price into the revenue of the dominion in the form of customs duty; but as a rule, what you buy is not the imported, but the domestic article the price of which the manufacturer has been able to raise to a point equal to or higher than the price of the foreign article plus the duty. I think that is an axiomatic statement. Who gets the tax then? Not the government surely, but the manufacturer.

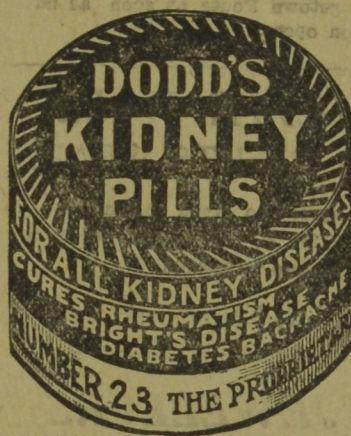
"It is a concession of the inability of the Canadian manufacturer to compete for him to ask for these privileges. We are asked to pay him a price from fifteen per cent. to thirty five per cent. or more higher than we pay the foreign manufacturer. That is how this colossal infant, this bearded infant, treats the people today. He started out with the idea that he should be protected in his infancy, but now, after many years he is apparently the same infant, feeding from the same nursing-bottle. Such a policy has become the means of fostering

the growth of a number of industries at the expense of the economic vitality of the country."

## AN IMPUDENT CLAIM.

"How many have allowed themselves for so long to be imposed upon by the claim that the protective tariff is for the benefit of the workingman in the presence of so many facts to the contrary. The audacity, the impudence of the claim is what amazes one in the face of the fact that the workmen of this country who are in unprotected industries are better paid than those who are in protected industries. I am free to admit that there cannot be free trade—I wish in all interests there could be—so long as the indirect instead of the direct method of taxation prevails as arranged at the dawn of confederation. But we can ameliorate wrongs, remove burdens, restrict special privileges, curb his interests, nourish freedom and liberty and sever the bonds of the masses. We can crush out the processes of favoritism granted at the expense of the masses. We can destroy the weeds to give room and air and light to nourish the plant so essential to the lives of our great consuming population, the toiling masses

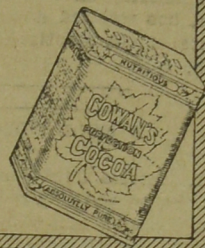
