CONTRACTOR MITCHELL ASKS FINALLY TO BE RELIEVED OF CONTRACT

School Board Yesterday Considered Smythe Street School Matter. Must Further Consider It Today ---Action Uncertain

This morning Contractor Moses Mitchell informed Secretary Sampson of the School Board that after careful reconsideration of the matter he had finally decided to request the Board to permit him to withdraw his tender for the construction of the new Smythe Street School building. This action upon the part of the contractor whose tender was the lowest, will compel the School Board to meet again to consider the matter. The meeting will be held this afternoon. What action the Board will take is uncertain. It has been suggested that new tenders be called for but one of those who tendered is understood to have made a strong protest against such action being taken. There is also a possibility that no tender will be accepted and some other arrangement be made for carrying on the work.

The School Board met yesterday afternoon and conferred with Contractor Mitchell with regard to his request to be permitted to withdraw his tender. Mr. Mitchell stated that owing to an error of about \$2,800 in his calculations it would mean a sure loss to him to erect the building at the figure at which he rendered. He was asked to reconsider the matter and give a final answer today and his reply was given as stated above.

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ICE IS WASTING AWAY RAPIDLY FROM STRONG CURRENT

Water Here at Standstill---Macnaquac Jam Still Solid---Ice for Two Miles Below Has Cracked and May Break up

The ice in the river here is wasting rapidly through the action of the current - which is very strong. Observers say that where the ice has broken it appears to be little more than a foot in thickness and rather soft. Last night the ice above the Highway Bridge moved again a short distance. The water at this point remains at the same level as yesterday. The temperature last night was below freezing point but the cold weather does not affect the river.

Reports from Manguerville this afternoon were that there had been no change in the ice, the latter showing no signs of moving.

Advices from Macnaquac are that the big ice jam there has not moved. Below the jam however, the ice has shown signs of breaking up. For about two miles below the big jam, the ice has cracked and broken and may run out.

Preparations for stream-driving are under full swing. A crew of thirty men was sent to the Tobique by James Doohan for Fraser Limited this morning and preparations are being made to send parties in for other people.

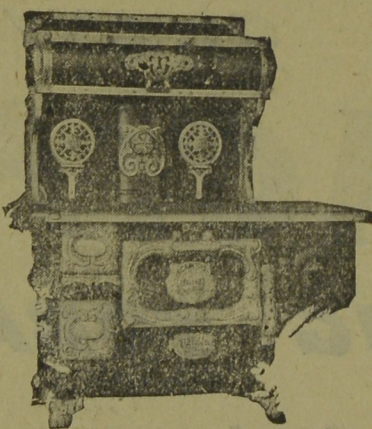

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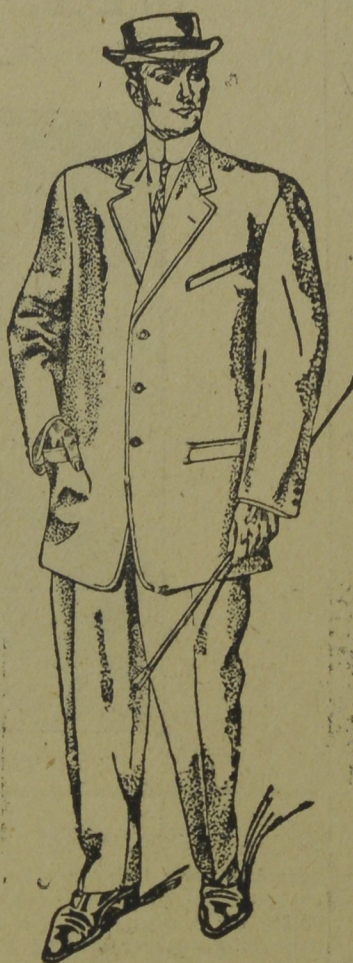
