THE GERMANS SAY
BATTLE SOON OVER

London, Sept. 18.—The Copenhagen correspondent of the Central News Agency has forwarded the following despatch received from Berlin: "The situation of the German troops in the great battle on the western frontier is good, especially in the centre, where the Germans have received substantial reinforcements. The end of the battle is expected soon."

AUSTRIAN AMBASSADOR
DENIES REPORTS

New York, Sept. 19.—Dr. Konstantin Dumba, Austrian ambassador today issued a statement of protest "against the false reports sent via London from Rome, Milan, Geneva, Copenhagen and St. Petersburg about the Austrian campaign in Russian Poland and Galicia." The ambassador declared untrue reports that the Austrians had lost since the battles of Lemberg 350,000 dead and wounded and 100,000 prisoners.

"The only tangible result of the Russian victories announced to the world he declared, is the occupation of East Galicia, a flat open country without any strategical positions which had to be given up to the enemy, as everybody knew in Austria. The news coming especially from Rome (often in the shape of fictitious cables, from St. Petersburg) insist upon the outbreak of panic and prevalence of famine in Vienna. Both tales are absolutely false and of pure fiction. Conditions are normal in the Austrian capital, where the Imperial Opera opened on the first of September."

NOTHING IN PEACE TALK

Bordeaux, Sept. 18.—The reported project of mediation by the United States among the warring nations has elicited much public and newspaper comment here. Referring to a despatch emanating from Berlin, according to which a conference to fix the basis of peace already has been summoned to meet in Washington, the Temps says:

"Germans, who are numerous in America, perhaps thought to render a service to their empire by stirring up opinion, but American opinion, like that of the English or the opinion of any other impartial country, sees through this game and has already given its verdict."

"There is a disaster greater than war. A hasty, deceptive peace would give only a breathing space, which

would enable Germanic militarism to prepare its revenge and a war worse than the present."

PEACE PROSPECTS.

Washington, Sept. 17.—Germany has acknowledged the United States' informal inquiry concerning further peace overtures with a non-committal comment, President Wilson told callers this afternoon. He declined to disclose the comment. The reply came from the German chancellor.

The German government has made known to the American government its attitude toward mediation for peace in Europe. It is said on the highest diplomatic authority that the Kaiser's attitude is as follows:

First—Germany would be glad to listen to mediation suggestions, but is absolutely prohibited by the attitude of England.

Second—Germany will not stop fighting so long as England declares this must be a war to the finish.

Third—Germany can take up the question of mediation and peace only when the allies are willing to assume a like attitude of conciliation and consideration.

Fourth—If this is to be a war to the finish, as England declares daily, then Germany will fight on. If the Allies are determined to crush and dismember her, then she will fight to the last man.

Fifth—If the world at large hopes for disarmament, then the crushing of Germany is the poorest way to accomplish it. Crushed, Germany will repeat the era after the Napoleonic wars and arm every man and child in the empire for the day of revenge.

Sixth—Germany is willing to call the war a draw. Such a solution, she maintains, would be most conducive to future peace in Europe and to disarmament. Complete victory on either side would not lead to stable conditions.

There are three prerequisites to Germany's consideration of peace negotiations:

First—There must be something more substantial in the offer than the mere tender of good offices of the United States. While recognizing the kindly interests of this government, yet it contains no assurances from the Allies. England must forego her demands for war to a finish and the complete crushing of Germany. As long as that attitude is persisted in Germany will be compelled to turn a deaf ear to all friendly offers.

Second—Germany in Europe must not be dismembered. While negotiations might be considered concerning colonies, the German empire must remain intact.

Third—Germany must be left alone by other powers around her in the future. Every man in the empire believes sincerely and honestly today that the war is one of self defence against the hostile encroachments of Russia, France and England. Live and let live is the policy that Germany wishes its enemies to observe.

The kindly offer of American mediation is declined by Germany because there is no assurance from the Allies that it would be considered by them.

KING ASSENTS TO HOME RULE BILL

London, Sept. 18.—King George's signature was today attached to the home rule for Ireland bill, which thus goes on the statute book.

Scenes of enthusiasm unusual in the staid legislature chambers of Westminster Palace, were enacted today when the two houses of parliament were prorogued.

While King George was absent, inspecting troops, his speech was read in the House of Lords by Viscount Haldane, the lord high chancellor, and in the House of Commons by John H. Whitley, the deputy speaker. When the announcement was made in the House of Lords that the royal assent had been given to the Irish Home Rule and the Welsh Church disestablishment suspensory bills and to several emergency measures, cheers were given for the passing of the Irish and the Welsh bills.

On the announcement of the passing of the Irish home rule bill in the House of Commons, the Nationalists and Liberals broke into loud cheers, which were repeated again and again.

Will Crooks, the Labor leader, asked if it were in order to sing "God Save the King." Without waiting for permission, he started the first verse himself and then broke down with emotion.

The anthem was taken up by the spectators in the galleries as well as by the members and the singing was heard in the palace yard.

As the members filed out of the chamber, Mr. Crooks cried out:

"God save Ireland."

John Redmond, the Irish Nationalist leader, replied:

"God save England."

Parliament will sit again on October 27.
