The reply of the government to Sir Wilfrid Laurier's pertinent queries was that the cost of living problem would be dealt with "some time" and the high commissioner's rumors, and Mr. Beck's revived relation thereto were "merely rumors."

A BATTLE FOR THE MASSES.

Although in the end the session closed perhaps more quietly than last session after the spectacular fight on the naval issue, the experienced parliamentarians know that the moral of the session and the significance of the closing are even more important. If a general election comes before another session, and the members on both sides are going home to prepare for it, the real issues upon which the people will have to decide have been broadened and more clearly defined as a result of the debates of the past four months. Last year it was, in essence, a question of responsible government and the Liberals won out in defence of that principle. This year it has been perhaps the greatest issue of the big interests as opposed to the masses of the people. In one form or another that has been the underlying principle at stake throughout the session. On the Conservative side the appeal, if it comes, will be an appeal to the influence of vested interests, backed up by a large campaign fund.

On the Liberal side the appeal made to the populace cause has been fundamental principles of greater freedom of trade, honesty and economy of administration and adherence to the interests of the masses of the people.
