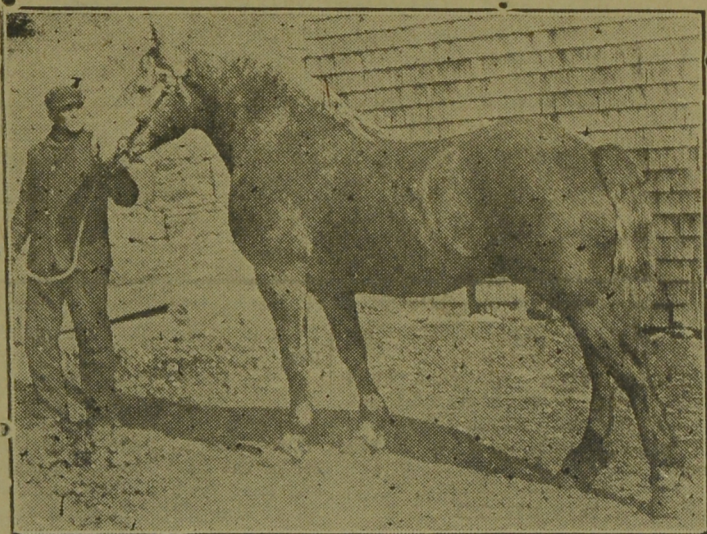

BIG SALARIES CAUSE HEARTBURNINGS IN LEAGUES

Federal League's Anxiety to Get Players Makes Lopsided Salaries Have Bad Effect--General Exodus to Federal League Expected Next Year--The Two Johnsons Prominent as Pitchers

New York, June 13—To the man atop "5 and 10" tower it begins to look as though the fat salaries that are being paid to some of the star ball players this season are sure to prove a good thing—for the stars who are drawing down the bales of kale.

But it seems to be a fact beyond dispute that in more than one instance the high-priced players are not delivering a brand of goods commensurate with the salary that is slipped them twice a month. An appreciation of this fact naturally tends to create more or less dissatisfaction among other players on the team.

After all, ball players are something on the order of human beings, though they may be called "boneheads" a million or more times a year. Now what these tossers are trying to figure out is, why, in the name of Adrian A., is one player paid double the money received by any other man on the team when there are half a dozen men in the same line-up who are playing as good if not better ball than the high-priced man. Big leaguers seldom begrudge a brother player a fancy salary, but they believe that the big money in the game today should be distributed a little more equitably.

With three big leagues competing for the best talent, and one of these leagues outside of organized baseball the salary question has become about the most important issue in the national pastime.

EFFECT OF FEDERALS.

The efforts of the Federal League to sign the star players are at the root of the high-salary problem. The Feds have given evidence of possessing a large bank roll and they seem willing to slip the rubber band when ever the service of the 18k. pastime are at stake.

This readiness on the part of the Federal League moguls to give up large gobs of perfectly good money is likely to be the magnet that will attract many National and American League players next year, particularly those players who failed to get in on the big money this season.

As both the National and American Leagues have been forced to boost salaries to figures never dreamed of a dozen years ago, while the attendance figures so far this season have been anything but startling, it is difficult to figure out how the two older organizations can pay their players more money and continue to run their baseball plants at a profit. Nevertheless, the magnates seem tagged to stand the "rifle" for a slant at the game from any angle shows that the player is in a position to demand turkey, gravy and all the trimmings.
