LIBERALS SELECT NEW SENATE LEADER

Ottawa, March 19—At a meeting of the Liberal members of the senate this afternoon, Hon. Hewitt Bostock, senatorial representative for Kamloops, B.C., was unanimously chosen to succeed the late Sir George Ross as the Liberal leader in the upper House.

During the illness of Sir George Ross, Senator Bostock was asked to take the temporary leadership and his selection today to permanently fill that responsible and honorable position is popular and fitting. The new leader is well equipped by character, training and ability for the task. He has been a member of the senate since 1904 and has always held the esteem and confidence of members on both sides of the chamber. He is an able debater, a good speaker and a well informed student of all public questions. At the time of the selection of the late Sir George Ross as Liberal leader to succeed Sir Richard Cartwright Senator Bostock was also considered for the position but the veteran ex-premier was the first choice.

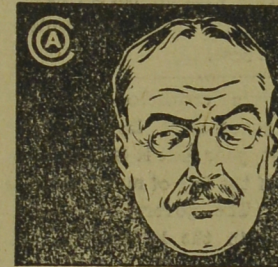
