and was roundly applauded. The amount will be devoted to the purchase of new instruments, a clarinet and slide-trombone being very much needed. In making the donation, Lt. Col. Loggie said that as commanding officer of the regiment he had always been much interested in the regimental band and was pleased to be able to continue that interest. The regiment as a whole claimed much of his interest and he hoped for a prosperous future for it. Under the commanding officer who was soon to take the rank of lieutenant-colonel he expected a period of great prosperity and efficiency for the corps. Major Gray was a young officer with every qualification.

DECIDED UPON CHANGES.

After a lengthy discussion in which all took part, it was decided to make a change in messing arrangements. For some years past a mess-caterer has conducted the officers' mess, paid at a certain rate per day. In the future the officers will run the mess themselves through a committee. The regimental canteen is also to be run by the officers instead of under the previous arrangements.

On motion it was decided also to exercise supervision over the sergeants' mess.

Connected with these matters was the appointment of a Business Committee which will have charge of all business of the regiment. The committee is composed of Capt. James Pringle, Capt. W. J. Osborne, Capt. J. P. McPeake and Lieut. D. W. Clarkson. The first three are also the Finance Committee.

Capt. Pringle, the quartermaster, was instructed to make arrangements for the removal of the mess cook-house at Sussex to a new site assigned to it by a change in the brigade lines.

MAJOR GRAY'S ADDRESS.

Major Gray, addressing the officers, mentioned the fact that Lt. Col. E. H. McLeod, M.P., being absent on parliamentary duties at Ottawa, had been unable to be present. Lt. Col. McLeod had had his tenure of command extended for three months and in consequence would command the regiment during its next annual training. At the expiration of that time, said Major Gray, he himself would succeed to the command. He asked for the hearty support of every officer in the corps which for the first time in some years, was at full strength in regard to officers. A commanding officer, he realized, could do little without the assistance of his subordinates but he felt sure he would get it. He wanted all to work together to put the 71st in a foremost place among the rural regiments of Canada.

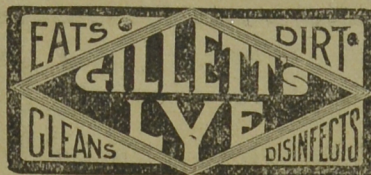

MARYSVILLE

Marysville, March 23—Although the two late trips of the suburban train between Fredericton and Marysville, have been cancelled, the people in both places, as well as at Gibson, are still wondering why it has been done. Supporters of the government say it was to lower expenses but as far as can be learned such is not the case. By cancelling the two late trains the night crew was done away with, nevertheless the day crew has to work overtime, some night until ten and eleven o'clock, in order to get through with the day's work. Therefore the government is not saving a cent, in fact, it is spending more as it has to pay the day crew for all overtime, which amounts to a great deal more than would pay the night crew on straight time.

Mr. Gutelius, the \$20,000 manager of the I.R.C., is evidently endeavoring to have a few cents on the Canada Eastern branch of the People's Railway to help pay his enormous salary, irrespective of the inconvenience of the travelling public. Mr. Gutelius suddenly becomes very economical and tries to make the people believe that he is actually saving money for the country by cancelling two trips of a suburban train from the capital of New Brunswick to its most important suburbs and trade centres. No wonder the Board of Trade of Fredericton are up in arms in protest against this outlandish move on the part of the present government at Ottawa. Not only is the public tired of such uncalled for treatment but the trainmen themselves are very much put out by the shift in railway affairs especially where no benefit is gained or saving made.

and that if they refused to go there might be a mutiny in the army which would mean a revolution in England and in six months there would be no king and no army.

MUTINY STORY DENIED

A denial was issued today of the reported mutiny of the Dorsetshire regiment. Frequent reports have been current of late of the strong sympathy of the Dorset men with the Ulsterites, owing to their extended stay in the garrison here. The same partisanship has been ascribed to the Norfolks, causing the authorities keen anxiety. The officers of these regiments were asked today if they would remain loyal to the king, and it is understood that they agreed to stand fast, although the men are much discontented at their continued confinement in barracks and the cancellation of all sporting events. In addition, they have expressed resentment at the organized attacks upon the army by the Nation lists, whose cause they might have to defend.

Sir Edward Carson said tonight that he had received letters of sympathy and encouragement from the United States. Replying to the statement that troop movement were only precautionary in consequence of the discovery of an Ulster plot to raid the military stations, he said:

There never was the least intention to take any provocative aggressive action, nor will any be taken, although I cannot say what might have happened had the government been foolish enough to be the aggressors themselves.

LLOYD-GEORGE FULL OF FIGHT

London, March 23—Mr. Lloyd-George at Huddersfield on Saturday declared that the country was confronted with the greatest issue since the days of the Stuarts. On behalf of the government he could say that the government would meet the defiance of popular liberties with the most resolute determination whatever the hazard might be.

London, March 21—The government's military precautions to preserve order in Ulster have precipitated a crisis without parallel in the history of the British army. Rather than be placed in a position where they might be called upon to act against the Ulster covenanters, numbers of officers have resigned their commissions.

While the war office refuses to say how many have resigned, popular belief based on reports from the different resignments is that the number of withdrawals have crippled the whole military organization in Ireland and prevented carrying out the orders for moving several large bodies of troops.
