## CARLETON COUNTY FARMER GIVES HIS IMPRESSIONS

Was Much Taken With the Evidence of Progress Made in Fredericton--Visited What He Thought Was the Experimental Farm, But Soon Discovered His Mistake.

To the Editor of The Mail:

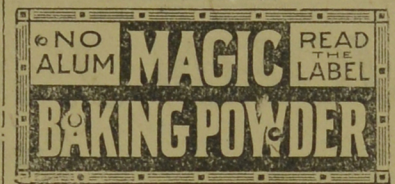
Dear Sir—I made a visit to Fredericton last week and after looking over your beautiful city I must say, I was very much taken with the progress that has been made in the style and beauty of the buildings, not only in the residential part of the city but also in the public buildings. The new Post Office is a splendid building and is a credit to the promoter, your late representative as Ottawa. Being a farmer and a stranger in the city, I wished to visit the Experimental Farm. It being a pleasant morning I started to walk. Crossing the railway as directed, I went up the hill along the beautiful driveway skirted by trees, to a house, a fine, two-story building. I naturally thought it was the superintendent's residence. Not seeing any one about I walked on by a barn and on to what I supposed was intended for an orchard. It was no doubt intended to be one of the finest orchards in the province when set out and the land must be in a great state of cultivation for the lambs' quarter or pig weed have such a fine growth that it is almost as high as the apple trees and it is only upon closer examination one discovers there are eight or nine rows of turnips between the apple trees, which will probably turn out a fine crop if some disaster befalls the pig weed.

I went on in another direction and there I saw two calves on tether, at least I took them to be Haytea calves such as were raised in my grandfather's days, in the early settlement of the country, only these calves had longer horns than they should have. I went on a little farther and I saw a young man with a fairly good-looking pair of horses. I looked them over and found that one was blind. By this time I began to realize that I had come to the wrong place for the Experimental Farm and asked the young man where I would find it. He told me that it was on the next hill, about one-half or three-quarters of a mile farther down. This place, he said, belonged to a private citizen. As I passed the house the owner was standing at the door, waiting for his auto and chauffeur, which were coming up the drive. I told him I had come to the wrong place and was hurrying on. He asked me who I was I said a farmer from up river. He did not ask me if I wanted a passage to town, but said, "Say, have you your photo with you?" I said I had not. I was asking a friend when I got to the city again what he could have wanted with my photo. My friend said: "Why, if he had got your photo and put it in the paper he would have made a draft on you." I was lucky not to have one.

Well, I left next day for home. Some days after I got back I picked up a Fredericton Gleaner in the store. My attention was called to an article on the Mayor of Fredericton, his lack of intelligence, his ignorance, etc., etc. Coming from a critic like that one, who could run a farm the way he was doing right in the City of Fredericton and to be so inhuman as to have two poor little yearling hills tethered in one place so long that there was not a vestige of nourishment near them it struck me as being very funny. The animals had the grass

gnawed to the bare ground and by their appearance they looked as if they had seldom been watered. If there is a society for the prevention of cruelty to animals in the city they should look into this case. Such a critic growing pig weed instead of turnips or alfalfa for lack of intelligence, lack of attention, lack of honor, etc. Oh, what a critic.

## PLAN A RAID BY AIR ON BRITAIN

London, Oct. 7.—In a despatch from The Hague, the correspondent of The Daily Express says that German newspapers reaching there indicate that Count Zeppelin is now at Wilhelmshaven, on the North Sea, with his staff. Wilhelmshaven is the point from which the great air raids on the British Isles is to start. One of the papers publishes an interview with the count in which he is quoted as saying he had not forgotten England and would prove it very soon.

It is also reported, the correspondent of The Express continues, that Count Zeppelin was summoned recently by Emperor William to Mainz. The emperor said to the count that he relied on him for a great work and offered to make him commander-in-chief of the German air fleet.

The count smilingly refused but said he would accept the title after he returned from England.

The Zeppelin staffs are working day and night at Wilhelmshaven and another station is being established at Emden for other types of airship.

Corporal-Major Grainger Showed King a Few Tricks

Among those who displayed their prowess before the King at a Life Guards' assault-at-arms was Corporal-Major Grainger, who has won the title of the best man of arms (dis-mounted) in the British army. ### WHAT IS A BURGLAR?

It Depends on What Time He Enters a House, in English Law

A criminal can break into your home, steal the family plate, even become so desperate as to attack your wife and mother-in-law, and yet not be a burglar. It all depends upon the time when the outrage occurs.

According to the law of England, the crime of burglary can only be committed between the hours of 9 p.m. and 6 a.m. If William Sikes forces an entrance into your house in the daytime he is not technically a burglar, but a housebreaker. From Sike's point of view there is a great difference. Housebreaking is treated as a less serious crime than burglary, and a criminal captured whilst operating at a quarter to nine in the evening would, perhaps, receive a lighter sentence than if caught an hour later.

But, burglar or housebreaker, you have no right to attempt to stop his depredations by planting man-traps or spring-guns in your garden. If you install these instruments of torture, and an unsuspecting "crook" walks into them and is consequently held fast, he will, if the implements of his craft are found on him, probably receive sentence for attempted felony, but you also render yourself liable to penal servitude.

Nor have you the right to shoot him in cold blood if you wake up suddenly and discover him crawling about the bedroom. Should he be armed and threaten you, you may blaze away, secure in the knowledge that you are merely defending yourself. You may also shoot if he disobeys your command to stand still.

If you offer to let him go "scot-free" conditionally upon his returning the plunder, you will be compounding a felony, which is a very serious offence.
