WOULD TREAT GERMANY
AS IF SHE WERE A MAD DOG

New York, Nov. 25.—E. Alexander Powell, F.R.C.S., author and journalist and special war correspondent, who returned to New York on the Adriatic, made public a letter which he received some time ago from a high official of the British War Office. Though he may not reveal the name of the writer, Mr. Powell says he regards this letter as the most important semi-official statement of the attitude of the British people toward Germany, as well as the most interesting indication of the intense bitterness of the British that has been written.

The letter says in part: "I dare say you will think this afternoon that I was talking with perhaps too much excitement and self-conviction on many subjects, but I wish you, if it is possible, to disabuse yourself of the idea that in the present war Germany is to be considered as an honorable foe or, indeed, as a member of the community of nations."

"If this had been so, the feeling would have been very different. We should have regretted fighting her, but we should have felt it a necessary duty, and we should have made peace on terms which never can be offered to her now."

"But her diplomats and her university professors, her artists, her men of business and the majority of her population have made it quite clear that she never will respect a treaty made between herself and any other country, if it suits her interest to tear it up; that the word of a German citizen never can be trusted, when it suits his interest to tell a lie and that the conventions agreed to in warfare by all other nations never will be regarded by German soldiers, when they think it their interest to violate them."

"These things being so, the Allies have no option but to treat Germany as if she were a mad dog and to put it out of her power, at all events during the lifetime of any one now living to repeat what she has been doing since last July."

"This feeling has been enormously intensified by the ramification of spies in every stratum of society in this country and in all other countries, who have abused our hospitality, and who are ready at any moment to destroy, by the foulest means, those who have trusted them."

"These facts produce a combination of circumstances which never has been observable before and that combination of circumstances has a result which will be unprecedented. No honorable Englishman who is alive now ever will have any personal dealings with any German again, if he can possibly help it, in any capacity. If it be necessary to meet them anywhere, they will be shunned as soon as possible. There are not many Germans left in any position of employment in England. There will be no more after the war. No Englishman ever will travel in Germany again if he can possibly avoid doing so."

"These are private conditions, which will obtain until all of us are dead, and they will be reflected in the conditions of peace which will be imposed by the united will of the three chief nations concerned upon Germany at the conclusion of the war, because Germany has placed herself outside the pale of civilization and no longer will be treated as a civilized nation."

"It is most important for American public opinion to realize this and to realize that toward any other nation in the world the attitude both of Englishmen and of our Allies would be entirely different, because we should be treating with honorable opponents, however deep might be our differences of opinion."

"There you have an English answer to Lissauer's poem 'A Chant of Hate Against England,' published in Jugend," said Mr. Powell. "I rather think the sentiments expressed will open American eyes."

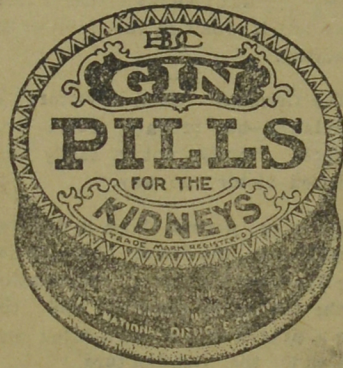

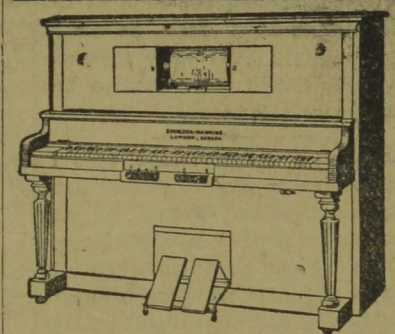
"Are it a reg'lar dog?" the man asked.
