They claim that visitors frighten the hens and cause a falling off in the egg yield This has been noticed by many breeders, and the wise poultrymen will accompany visitors and at once stok any actions on their part which will tend to exlite the birds. The eggproducing breeds-Leghorns, Anconas, Minorcas, etc.—are more nervous and more easily frightened than the larger breeds, and seem more afraid and suspicious of strangers.

The hen, no matter how high strung does not fear the hand that feeds her. In a little while the flock know when to expect their owner or attendant and run to meet him. Kindness and gentle handling, excluding everything likely to cause commotion in the poul tryyard, s the best and only way to look after poultry. It is useful on many occasions to have the birds so tame that they can be picked up easily. A quiet hen that will permit ger owner to handle her while on the nest is worth three times as much as the leaving the nest hurriedly on the approach of owner or attendant.


