## FEWER EGGS FROM FRIGHTENED HENS

(Family Herald and Weekly Star.)

It is reported that some of the large egg farms in the United States charge admission to their poultry plants, not with the idea of making profit, but simply to discourage visitors. They claim that visitors frighten the hens and cause a falling off in the egg yield. This has been noticed by many breeders, and the wise poultryman will accompany visitors and at once stop any actions on their part which will tend to excite the birds. The egg-producing breeds—Leghorns, Anconas, Minorcas, etc.—are more nervous and more easily frightened than the larger breeds, and seem more afraid and suspicious of strangers.

The writer remembers the large number of visitors who flock to the poultry department of one of our agricultural colleges. On bad days or in the winter time when the pens in the continuous house would be pretty full of birds, some visitor, apparently of the opinion the birds ought to perform for the visitors, would rattle the wire or in some way start a commotion among the hens. It is bad for the birds in the pen and fifty times worse for those on trap-nests. An immediate banging of the trap commences, the egg the bird may have laid is probably broken and the bird cannot get out for some time. The visitors gone, the hen quiets down and in all probability turns around and eats the broken egg. In addition to exciting the birds—which is undesirable—the bad habit of egg-eating may be formed. This case is hardly applicable to the average poultry farm, yet it is true and will serve to show how undesirable undue excitement is to the high-strung laying hen.

The hen, no matter how high strung does not fear the hand that feeds her. In a little while the flock know when to expect their owner or attendant and run to meet him. Kindness and gentle handling, excluding everything likely to cause commotion in the poultryyard, is the best and only way to look after poultry. It is useful on many occasions to have the birds so tame that they can be picked up easily. A quiet hen that will permit her owner to handle her while on the nest is worth three times as much as the wild hen that endangers her eggs by leaving the nest hurriedly on the approach of owner or attendant.

## RUSSIAN WOMEN HELP IN WAR

Petrograd, Russia, (via London, Nov. 11). While noisy demonstrations of enthusiasm and loyalty are being held in the large cities a silent transformation is taking place in the depths of the country and isolated corners of Russia. The news from Great Russia is especially stimulating and hopeful. In the villages the peasants are organizing committees to help the families of departed soldiers. Sometimes the local nobleman and priest take part in the work but usually the committee is made up exclusively of peasants. The peasant women are elected to committees on an equal footing with the men.

One of the first decisions of these committees was that the land of the wives and widows of soldiers should be plowed and sown by the men left behind. All the women in the villages are knitting socks and sewing and preparing linen for shirts and bandages which are collected by the women members of the committees. Though the government has been compelled officially to support co-operative societies, its interference in the last four years has been keenly felt. Lately the officials have ceased their harassing methods and the co-operative societies are extremely active. The people have been able to compare the quiet and profitable dealing of the societies with private enterprise in the matter of food and the material superiority of the former has been obvious. Co-operative societies are increasing rapidly in the provinces, especially around Moscow, and cheap credit has been organized. In Tver province nearly every village has a co-operative savings bank.

The "Black Hundred" organization so carefully fostered in Stolypin's regime have sunk into oblivion and the peasants, who were kept down by police oppression have begun to assert themselves. With the abolition of the state monopoly in the sale of vodka healthy activity is invading village life, which begins to have a different aspect.

## GERMANY IS FEEL- ING THE PINCH

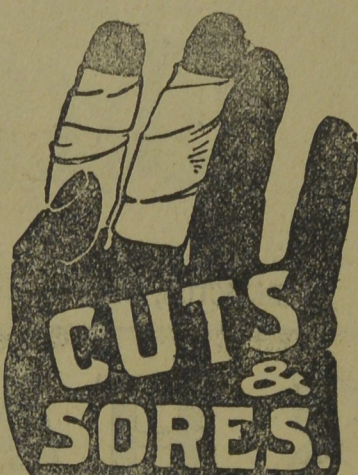

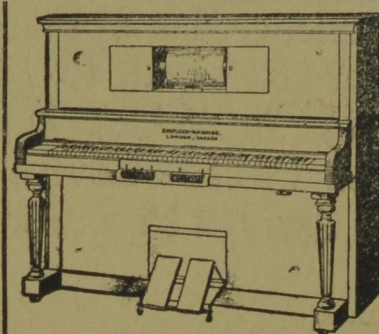
