HON. WILLIAM TEMPLEMAN DEAD

Victoria, B.C., Nov. 15—At three o'clock today died one of the grand old men of Liberalism, not only in British Columbia, but of all Canada, the Hon. Wm. Templeman, former minister of mines and president of the Times Printing and Publishing Company, Limited, Victoria. Born in Pakenham, Ontario, Sept. 28, 1844, Mr. Templeman came to British Columbia in 1884 and entered the newspaper business, being associated with the Times at Victoria ever since that year. He made his first appearance as a candidate for the House of Commons in 1891, but was defeated. Nothing daunted, he tried again in 1896 and the next year was called to the senate and entered the Laurier cabinet without portfolio in 1902. In 1906 he was created minister of inland revenue, and on May 3rd, of the following year, was made minister of mines in the creation of the department.

He resigned from the upper house and was elected to the House of Commons for Victoria in 1906. In the election of 1908 he was unsuccessful in Victoria, but was elected by acclamation for Comox-Atlin. He was defeated in 1911 on the question of reciprocity.

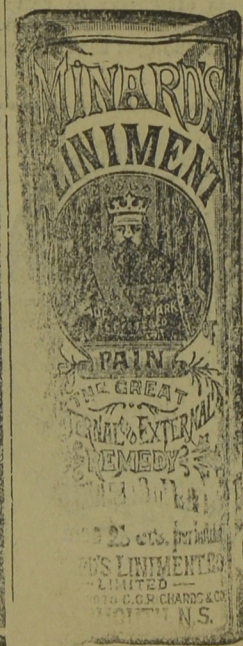
NOT HIS FUNERAL.
