

QUEBEC WAS TRUE TO LIBERALISM

Crushing Defeat of the Tory-Nationalist Forces

Government of Sir Lomer Gouin Swept the Province from End to End--The Tories made even a Worse Showing than in the Last Contest--Almost a Clean up for the Liberals in Quebec District where Lavergne Held Forth--Body Blow to Borden's Government

Montreal, May 15--The Quebec provincial elections today resulted in the return of the Gouin government by an increased majority over that which it had in the last house.

By the redistribution act passed at the last session of the legislature seven new seats were added and while the opposition captured three of these it lost two others, thus making the net gain in the Liberal majority in the new house six.

All the members of the cabinet were re-elected, the only one to suffer defeat being the Hon. Chas. Devlin, in Temiskamingue. Mr. Devlin was however successful in Nicolet county.

Premier Gouin was elected by large majorities in both Portneuf and St. Johns.

Mr. Tellier, the opposition was re-elected in Joliette, but two of his leading lieutenants, Armand Lavergne and Jules Prevost, both of whom ran in two counties, suffered defeat in one. Mr. Lavergne winning in Montmagny and losing in Montmorency, and Mr. Prevost suffering defeat in L'Assomption and winning in Terrebonne.

WON ON ITS RECORD

The government appealed to the people on its good record while the opposition charged it with extravagances citing the erection of a \$3,000,000 jail and a \$600,000 technical school in Montreal as examples and contending that the money could have been better spent in advancing the interests of primary education in the rural districts of the province.

Good roads also figured, the government relying upon its programme and the opposition contending that the money could be spent to better advantage alleging that the government's policy tended to favor those roads which would be largely used by automobiles to the neglect of those which were of greater value to the farmers.

GLOOM IN TORY CAMP.

Ottawa, May 15--The sweeping victory of the Liberals in Quebec is taken at Ottawa as clear indication of what the province will do for the Liberals when Sir Wilfrid Laurier leads them in the next federal fight.

The Dominion government gave all the aid it was able to the Conservative-Nationalist opposition, led by Tellier and Lavergne.

The three French ministers, Messrs. Monk, Nantel and Pelletier, appeared upon the platform against Premier Gouin and through patronage did all they could to influence the result.

The campaign against Gouin was liberally financed from Ottawa and the decisive defeat is a great disappointment to the government here. It is taken as an indication that Quebec is still solidly Liberal and will go so when the Dominion election is held.

In Ottawa the Liberals are jubilant over the result in Quebec and the government correspondingly depressed.

PREMIER GOVIN ON THE RESULT

Quebec, May 15--Premier Gouin received the news of the election at his office in the parliament buildings this evening. Hon. Messrs. Devlin and returns came in Sir Lomer received Kaine were with him. When the first returns smilingly. "We have won our election," said the premier, "and I am not disappointed. It seems as if I had given the opposition too generous a division and the opposition will not get the twenty seats which I allowed."

"I am pleased to see," said the premier, "that the electors of the province are able to vote with intelligence, and I am gratified by the large majorities which have supported my followers. The only disappointment is the defeat of Hon. Mr. Caron in L'Islet but that will soon be remedied."

THE LATE KING OF DENMARK

Body En Route to Copenhagen on Board the Royal Yacht

Unpleasant Rumors in Regard to His Majesty's Death Shown to be Without Foundation

Hamburg, May 15--The body of the late King Frederik VIII of Denmark who died here under tragic circumstances, on Tuesday night was started on its journey to Copenhagen at 8 o'clock this morning. A short and simple funeral service was held in the rooms of the hotel before the casket was carried down the stairs by twelve municipal employees attired in quaint fifteenth century costumes. They wore black doublets, knee breeches, white stockings, black plumed hat and swords. As the procession passed out other officials in Mediaeval costumes, lined up on each side of the door.

The widowed Queen, Louisa, left the hotel on the arm of Prince Harold, her third son. Prince Gustave and the Princesses Thira and Dagmar the three youngest children of the late King, who had travelled with him and the Queen from Nice, followed immediately after their mother. All appeared to be deeply affected.

Queen Louisa just before the casket was moved left the rooms of the hotel of her own accord and with a voice breaking with emotion addressed a few touching phrases to the members of the Danish colony who with a large number of the citizens of Hamburg, had assembled on the staircase.

Her Majesty reminded them of the pleasure her late husband had found in visiting Hamburg and thanked them for their kindness and consideration since his death.

The incident was totally unexpected and many of those present were weeping when the Queen finished. A military escort was waiting outside the hotel, and saluted as the casket was brought out while great crowds of spectators gathered along the route to the station notwithstanding the drizzling rain.

Another Guard of Honor was drawn up inside the train shed and presented arms as the casket was placed on the funeral car.

In the capital he learned the full result and was elated. The victory seemed to make him even more young and he was as gleeful as a boy.

LATER RETURNS

Montreal, May 16--Elated returns dribbling in today from remote polls made no practical difference in the standing of the parties, following yesterday's provincial elections. This morning's tabulations showed the standing to be:


Liberals, 62; Conservatives, 17; electors to be held, 2; Liberal majority, 45. The vote was small all over the province, in some places not fifty per cent. of those on the lists troubling to cast their ballots.

The results were a setback to the Liberal party. None of their candidates being elected, and several losing their deposits.

In the old House there were 53 Liberals and 16 Conservatives, seven new seats were created prior to yesterday's election.

BANDIT CHIEF SHOT HIMSELF

Paris, May 16--That Octave Garnier, the leader of the Automobile Bandits, died by his own hand, is the opinion of Dr. Paul of the prefecture of the police, who performed an autopsy. The death wound, according to the medical expert, was caused by a bullet fired point blank at very close range, which entered the right temple and passed completely through the head.

In addition to this an ordnance revolver bullet had traversed lower part of the thorax.

Among other things, he explains that he became an anarchist because he hated work, which he writes is, "One of the forms of Capitalistic exploitation."

Vallet's note-book contained a complete collection of portraits of defectives. Seven automatic pistols were found in the ruins.

CHURCHILL ON THE NAVY

The First Lord of the Admiralty Looks for the Colonial Navies

The British Admiralty Prepared to Give Dominions Full Control of the Same

London, May 16--The First Lord of the Admiralty Winston Churchill, speaking at the banquet of the Shipwrights Company last night referred to the Naval Development in recent years as a growth in the concentration of the British Fleet at home which combined with the enormous development of foreign navies, had resulted in a sensible restriction of the mobility of the British Navy. He appealed to the overseas dominions to remedy this defect.

Mr. Churchill believed that the main naval development in the coming decade, would be found in the growth of the Colonial Navies, that while the British navy maintained the sea supremacy against all comers at decisive points, the daughter states should guard and patrol the rest of the Empire.

The admiralty he said, was prepared to give the Dominions full control over the movements of their naval forces, in times of peace.

STREET SWEEPER USED FOR FIRST TIME

Many Citizens Watched its Operation on Queen Street--Good Results Obtained

The piece of apparatus most recently acquired by the Road and Street Department, the street sweeper was in operation last evening for the first time. The machine under the personal direction of Road Commissioner Jewett was used to cleanse the Tarvia and Hassam pavement on Queen Street. Some difficulty was experienced at first in adjusting the brush so as to obtain the best results but that difficulty was soon overcome. The roadway was first wet by a street sprinkler and the sweeper used upon it.

The Road Commissioner stated that there would be no regular schedule by which the sweeper would be operated but that whenever it was thought the pavement was dirty enough the machine would be used. The evening cleaning will be done.

The operation of the street-sweeper was watched last evening by a number of citizens and the remarks were generally appreciative. The Tarvia pavement was found to be in excellent condition after being swept. It is probably that as the operatives obtain experience the results obtained with the sweeper will improve.

Honorary Degrees of LL. D. for Hon. Josiah Wood and Rev. T. W. Street--Arthur N. Carter Winner of Alumni Gold Medal for Latin Essay and George B. Carpenter Winner of Brydone-Jack Scholarship--Large Attendance at Encenial Exercises

The University of New Brunswick completes the one hundred and twelfth year of its existence today and graduated this afternoon the largest class in her history. The class was composed of forty members, eleven ladies and twenty-nine gentlemen. Twenty-two were graduated in Arts, thirteen in Civil Engineering, three in Electrical Engineering and two in Forestry. The encenial proceedings were favored by fine weather and were attended by large numbers of interested spectators. The regular program was followed. The morning was occupied by a meeting of the University Senate, an account of which will be found elsewhere in this paper, and by the inspection of the various departments.

The valedictory by Mr. J. T. Herbert, was the last item of the program and is generally conceded to be one of the best delivered at a U.N.B. encenial in recent years.

Tweedie by the Chief Superintendent of Education, the City of Fredericton Gold Medal by His Worship Mayor Hooper, the Alumnae Society's Scholarship by Mrs. H. F. McLeod.

SUBJECTS ANNOUNCED

It was announced that the subject for the Thesis for the City of Fredericton Gold Medal in 1913 would be "The Professional Forester and What he May Accomplish for New Brunswick." For the English Essay for the Douglas Gold Medal in 1913 the subject will be "The Development and Value of the Commission as a means of the State's Regulation of Trade and Industry."

TWO HONORARY DEGREES

The presentation of medals, prizes and honor certificates and the conferring of degrees followed. Two honorary degrees of LL.D. were conferred, one upon Hon. Josiah Wood, Lieutenant Governor of New Brunswick and the other upon Rev. T. W. Street of St. John, who took the degree of B. A. in 1851. Rev. Dr. Street was formerly sub-dean of Christchurch Cathedral in this city. He has the distinction of having taken a degree before any other living graduate of the U. N. B.

Mr. Earle R. Macnutt of the graduating class, winner of the Douglas Gold Medal then read a selection from his essay.

His Lordship Bishop Richardson followed with an address to the graduating class. His Lordship spoke extemporaneously but nevertheless gave a fine address which contained much excellent advice to the graduating class.

Mr. Arthur N. Carter, winner of the Alumni Gold Medal for translation of English into Latin then read a portion of his essay.

The Alumni Oration by Hon. Geo. E. Foster, M.A., LL.D., followed. The Minister of Trade, who is one of the University's most distinguished graduates, gave a most scholarly address in the eloquent manner for which he is noted. His address was inpromptu, but lost nothing in interest on that account.
