## HOW THE COALITION GAME IS WORKED

(St. John Telegraph)

Fredericton, May 11.—Day by day the Liberals of New Brunswick are becoming more convinced of the fact that they were deceived by the Hazen Fleming promise that they would conduct a government "free from party prejudice or bias." Thousands voted to put the government out of power because they believe the promise of Mr. Hazen who was leader of the opposition at that time, but as soon as he gained power their credibility received a rude shock because they saw Liberal office-holders dismissed on every hand and conservatives taking their places. And yet the leaders kept repeating from time to time in different sections of the province that their was a coalition government that John Morrissey was a Liberal and for that reason they were entitled to Liberal support.

John Morrissey was playing a lone some hand. True, he called himself a Liberal but he was about the only one who thought so. He was in company with Tories, he played their games, he dismissed Liberals right and left, he gave orders for public works that would assist Conservatives in dominion elections, and continued where he was.

Morrissey's "Liberalism" was an asset worth having, both to Morrissey, himself, and to the government who knew that Liberal votes elected them and unless they could retain those votes they must retire from power. That is the situation today. New Brunswick is a Liberal in federal politics, and if Liberals are true to their colors, are true to their instinct, and to their province, it will be Liberal after the provincial elections, A. B. Copp will be premier.

HOW THE GAME IS WORKED  
But with Morrissey on the North Shore, the Globe in St. John, Fleming hopes to do in 1912 what Hazen did in 1908, persuade enough Liberals to vote with him to keep him in power. It remains with the Liberals to see if this can be done. Mr. Hazen was continually referring to the Globe as a "Liberal" newspaper. The fact is, the Globe is about as much of a "Liberal" newspaper as John Morrissey is a "Liberal."

It is not usual to see Liberal newspapers and printing offices patronized so generously by Tory Governments as the Globe is. Ever since the old government was turned out in New Brunswick the Globe printing office has had a generous share of printing from Mr. Hazen and Mr. Fleming. That is the principal reason this "Liberal" newspaper fails to see anything wrong with the present local government. The same reason applies in federal politics. The people who read the newspapers do not always compare the advertising with the editorial columns. But since the Borden government has been in power the Globe has all the advertising from the federal departments that are sent to Conservative newspapers.

Again, it may be said that Tories do not place newspapers they consider "Liberal" on their patronage list. Still it is an advantage for a political leader to be able to stand in his place in the house of commons or in the house of assembly and read in triumphant tones some cordial commendation of their government from that "old Liberal newspaper the St. John Globe." That is the trick Mr. Hazen performs at Ottawa, and Mr. Fleming at Fredericton. Why not? They pay the price and the goods are furnished.

"NO LIBERALS NEED APPLY"  
But how much longer will the Liberals of the province be deceived? Premier Fleming dropped the mask in a fit of anger in the legislature this session when the famous "Tender platform plank" was scored. Public printing was before the house and the enormous sums paid the Fredericton Gleaner were being referred to as well as the fact that although the government had promised to give the work by tender not tender had been asked of Liberal newspapers.

The premier thereupon declared that even should The Telegraph offer to do the government printing cheaper than it was being done he would not give it the order. "No Liberals need apply" was the doctrine nailed to the mast there.

The same principle was followed a short time ago by a parish road superintendent in King county. He was laying out a new road, and a hard working Liberal farmer living near at hand asked for some work. "Can't do it," he replied, "Jones orders are that no Grits are to be employed on this or any other job." The spirit of partyism is not confined to the road superintendents. A restaurant keeper in Sussex was selling "Premier" beer which contains between one and two per cent of alcohol. He had no idea he was offending the law for none of the good citizens of Sussex had ever noticed any signs of exhilaration from drinking it. But the Scott Act Inspector is an ardent Tory and the restaurant keeper had changed his politics and become a Liberal and he is willing to make affidavit that the inspector told him it was because he had changed his politics that he reported him for selling intoxicating beverages. 
