## THOUSANDS OF RIFLES

(Continued from Page One.)

The Daily Telegraph editorially fears that a coup may harden the heart of the Pharaoh of the cabinet. It warns the ministers that any attempt to discover the hiding places of arms will result in their immediate distribution and asks whether nothing but bloodshed will convince the government that there is no way of dealing with Ulster but by conceding its just demands.

The Morning Post, under the caption "On the Slippery Edge of War," refers to the news as grave and ominous, and practically invites government action by the assertion that it is obvious that the government cannot ignore such a breach of its proclamations.

### DEMAND PUNISHMENT OF RINGLEADERS.

The ministerial organs find in the event ample justification for the recent military preparations of the government. The Daily News refers to it as one of the gravest events since the beginning of the home rule conflict and demands that every person should be punished who participated in Friday's rebellion.

The Daily Chronicle says that the Ulster council sets its volunteers to commit a series of violent crimes that show Carsonism in its full criminal colors, which will cause the democracy of the British Islands not merely to consent but to demand that two faced treason mongers should no longer be permitted to play with fire. It also demands the immediate punishment of the ringleaders.

### TROOPS ORDERED TO ULSTER

London, April 27.—The Daily Mail's Dublin correspondent says that three infantry regiments have been ordered from Dublin to Ulster Monday. He adds that Augustine Birrell, chief secretary for Ireland, was in Dublin Sunday directing the arrangements.

R. A. Corbett of St. John has informed the Fredericton School Board that he has accepted the contract for the erection of the new Smythe Street School Building which is to be ready for occupation by December 1. Work on the excavation will begin in a few weeks.

About the city there is a considerable amount of adverse comment on the fact that the contract has been awarded outside Fredericton. Many citizens think that public works of that kind should be built by local contractors and that in spite of the unusual developments in connection with the tenders for the Smythe St. School it was not necessary to give the contract outside Fredericton.

## LYNCH-STANTON KNEW OF OVERPAYMENT

Ottawa, April 22.—While Mr. Lynch-Staunton was incorporating in his report on the National Transcontinental Railway the charge that the Liberal Government had allowed a "waste" of some \$600,000 in over-payments to contractors for over-break, he knew at the same time that under the present Government at least \$350,000 more had been allowed to contractor J. D. D. McArthur for over break that the Liberal government was prepared to allow. That was one of the main points brought out before the Commons Public Accounts Committee this morning in concluding the instigated by the Liberals into the payments to contractor McArthur for over-break.

### CHIEF ENGINEER'S TESTIMONY

Chief Engineer Gordon Grant of the National Transcontinental Commission, who was on the stand this morning, stated that the settlement effected with McArthur, whereby the latter had been allowed the extra \$350,000, contrary to the report of the Board of Arbitrators appointed under the late Government, had been discussed with Mr. Lynch-Staunton as well as with Major Leonard and Hon. Frank Cochrane.

Major Leonard said Mr. Grant had been quite agreeable to the settlement, and presumably Mr. Lynch-Staunton, who was at that time acting as advisory counsel for the N. T.R. Commission, had also endorsed the settlement. Yet in spite of this the Guelph-Staunton report deliberately charged that the late Government had paid the contractors a total of \$600,000 too much on account of over-break.

### THINKS McARTHUR EARNED IT ALL

Mr. Grant, who was examined by Mr. Wm. German, M.P., said this morning that Mr. McArthur had objected to the award of the Board of Arbitrators deducting \$12,000 from the amount claimed by him for over-break. Mr. McArthur was willing to accept a deduction of \$150,000. Mr. Grant said that after going into the matter with the district engineers, with Major Leonard, with Mr. Lynch-Staunton, and with the Hon. Frank Cochrane, he had concluded that \$150,000 was a fair and reasonable amount to deduct. Mr. Grant declared that, all things being considered, he did not think Mr. McArthur had received a dollar that he did not earn.

### A SIGNIFICANT RESULT

The committee decided to report the evidence to the House. This is the significant result of the first opportunity of the Liberals to investigate what has been done by the present Government in carrying on the construction of the National Transcontinental Railway. It may be noted that at the last meeting of the committee Major Leonard testified that the investigating Commissioners were not supposed to do any investigating into what had been done after the present Government assumed office, notwithstanding the fact that the instructions to the commissioners were for a complete investigation, with no time limit specified.

## SLAYER OF POLICEMAN ON TRIAL

Newark, N.J., April 24.—The case of Salvatore Leporio, charged with the murder of Policeman John J. McGovern, came up in court today for its second trial. The killing of the police officer occurred October 13, 1912. Leporio was convicted but he appealed. The conviction was reversed on the ground that an intercepted letter to an attorney, which gave the details of the crime, was a privileged communication and should not have been admitted as evidence.
