be given the South African land grant because they were willing to go to South Africa, if needed. If the government is willing to give a bounty to these men then let's all go after it. If we didn't happen to be alive at the time of the Fenian Raid it's no bar; remember that if you had been you would have been willing to go to the front."

COL. HUGHES' TRIP.

Ottawa, Feb. 4—Colonel Hughes' famous trip to Europe last summer was the subject of another question by Mr. Proulx today, who wanted to know how many officers, stenographers, servants and officers' wives and daughters accompanied the minister to Europe, what were the expenses of the trip and what the officers and employees were paid.

Col. Hughes said there were twenty-one officers, a private secretary and an assistant, two officials. No wives and daughters were in the party officially. The expenses of the ladies were borne by the husbands and fathers of them and the expenses of the party paid by the government amounted to \$42,262. The officers, while on the trip, received pay according to rank, amounting to \$3,984 and for subsistence and other allowances received \$10 a day. Members of the party other than officers received actual expenses and their permanent pay. The officers visited the French, Swiss and British manœuvres, while the minister of militia "visited the German divisional manœuvres and the Dutch and Belgian military centres." Colonel Hughes added that a full report of the trip was being prepared by Colonel Cruikshank and when completed would be placed in the hands of the members.

FENIAN RAID "VETERANS."

Mr. Michaud was told that men enlisted for military service to resist the Fenian Raid in 1866 consisted of 125,031, divided as follows:

Upper Canada, 12,199.

Lower Canada, 7,598.

Nova Scotia, 53,779.

New Brunswick, 44,055.

In the year 1870 the men called out numbered 43,541, divided as follows:

Ontario, 20,956.

Quebec, 15,066.

Nova Scotia, 5,192.

New Brunswick, 3,327.

The total called out to resist the two raids numbered 166,522.

Mr. Hughes of Prince Edward Island, was informed by Colonel Hughes that "the department had no record of any Prince Edward Island corps having been called out because of the Fenian Raid."

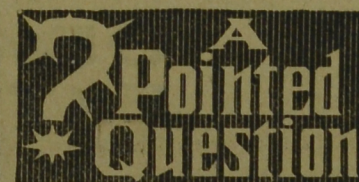
