ACTION FROM

AUTO ACCIDENT

IS WITHDRAWN

Suit of Arthur N. Brown vs George Bartlett Will Not be Tried—Arose From Accident at Temperance Vale

An action brought before the Circuit Court for loss of services through alleged injury in an automobile accident has been dropped. The suit was that of Arthur N. Brown et al vs. George Bartlett. The suit was withdrawn on Tuesday and the plaintiffs, husband and wife, who were here for some weeks have returned to their home in Methuen, Mass. The suit was brought originally through Crockett & Guthrie but recently was in the hands of C. D. Richards, Dr. J. D. Phinney, K.C., acted for Mr. Bartlett.

Mr. and Mrs. Brown formerly lived at Temperance Vale but recently have resided at Methuen, Mass. In the summer of 1912 Mrs. Brown was visiting at her former home. On July 17, 1912, it was alleged by the plaintiff. The defendant while driving his automobile struck a carriage in which Mrs. Brown and a lady friend were driving. Mrs. Brown was alleged to be so severely injured in the accident that her husband had to maintain a servant for some time to care for her.

When the case came for trial at the present sittings of the Circuit Court, however, the plaintiff's case appeared so weak that the suit was withdrawn. Mr. Bartlett paid nothing.

FURS DECLINE

IN PRICE ON NEW

YORK MARKET

Prices Have Fallen From Ten to Fifty Per Cent in Almost all Furs Obtainable in This Section

Trappers and others in the section who sell furs will regret to learn that the sale of furs by C. M. Lampson & Co. of New York, which took place January 22 to 23 showed that in almost all furs obtainable in this section there was a fall in price which varied from ten to fifty per cent. as compared with the price paid in March last. This fall in price is understood to be the result of oversupply upon the fur-market.

Details of the decline in prices are given in Lampson & Company's report. Fox, red, is ten per cent. cheaper. Raccoon is the same as last year, being the only fur which did not decline in price. Spring muskrat is thirty per cent. lower, winter muskrat thirty-five per cent. lower, fall muskrat forty per cent. lower. Black, short-stripe and long-stripe skunk are twenty per cent. lower. White skunk is twenty per cent. cheaper. Mink is ten per cent. cheaper. Other furs have shown declines as follows:

Otter, twenty per cent.
Lynx, forty per cent.
Fisher, thirty per cent.
Bear, forty per cent.
Wild-cat and house-cat, forty per cent.
