WILL ASK TURKEY FOR AN EXPLANATION

Washington, Nov. 18—The United States government has directed Ambassador Henry Morgenthau at Constantinople to ask the Ottoman government for an explanation of the firing by Turkish land forces at a launch from the American cruiser Tennessee, which was proceeding from Vouriah to the American consulate at Smyrna Asia Minor.

Secretary Daniels, with the approval of President Wilson, simultaneously called the commanders of the Tennessee and the North Carolina, also in the Mediterranean, to take no action which might embarrass the American government and to await specific instructions from Washington concerning the general situation.

These steps followed the receipt of a message from Captain Benton C. Decker, commander of the Tennessee, which was phrased in this statement from the navy department:

"Captain B. C. Decker, in command of the Tennessee, wired Secretary Daniels this morning that while proceeding from Vouriah to Smyrna to make official calls, boat was fired on. Consuls anxious for safety of consulate. Tennessee proceeded to and left Vouriah at request of Ambassador and is now anchored in the harbor of Scio (Chios), Greece, from which Captain Decker's telegram was sent. Secretary Daniels wired for fuller information."

LONDON MANSION NOW A HOSPITAL

London, Nov. 14—Presided over by Miss Muriel Wilson, the noted society beauty, as nurse in charge, what is probably one of the most luxurious hospitals in the world, has been just opened in London.

The new hospital is Dorchester House, in Park Lane, the residence of the late Whitelaw Reid, when he was United States Ambassador to England. All the splendid apartments of the house are now occupied by wounded officers, and the great rooms where once the notables of the world were used to gather when Mr. Reid occupied the mansion are now filled with cots and medicine tables and have become dormitories of a great war hospital.

The mansion is owned by Lieut.-Col. Sir George Holford. He recently turned it over to the authorities as a hospital for wounded and convalescent officers. Sir Alfred Fripp, surgeon in ordinary to the king, is attending the wounded there while Miss Wilson, with a number of young society women as assistants ministers to the comfort of the men.

HOW MR. PELLETIER

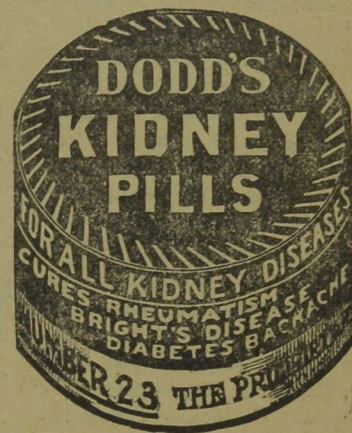
SOON RECOVERED

Ottawa, Nov. 18—In view of the official statements given out last month, at the time of Hon. L. P. Pelletier's retirement from the cabinet to the effect that he was a very sick man, and urgently in need of an extended holiday, his appointment today to the Quebec superior court, in succession to Mr. Justice Delorme, of Montreal, who has retired on superannuation, comes as a surprise to those outside the cabinet.

When the ex-postmaster general left the cabinet there were rumors to the effect that his retirement was not altogether due to the ostensible reason given. His appointment now to the onerous post of justice of the superior court lends color to the rumors that his retirement was really due to grounds other than ill-health and that it was part of a general scheme of cabinet reorganization with a view to eliminating the taint of Nationalism in the cabinet and to strengthening the Quebec representation.

Premier Borden's appointment of

Hon. P. E. Blondin to succeed Hon. Bruno Nantel rather upset the plans of the cabinet reorganization in this respect, but Mr. Pelletier's retirement had been previously arranged in accordance with the original plans, and it is understood now that his appointment to the bench had been promised to him when he resigned. Later on it is expected he will succeed to the chief justiceship of the province.
