MR. DUGAL'S CHARGES LATE WAR

Commission. On the other hand the Hon. Mr. Flemming has testified that he in no way directed such extortion. But it was claimed on the part of Mr. Dugal that such direction was amply proven and the evidence pointing to that conclusion cannot be lightly treated or dismissed. It was shown by the Premier's own testimony that suggestions for the collection of a party fund, or as it was called in the conversation an "educational" fund, had come to him from Mr. George Cutler, whose firm subsequently contributed a very large amount, and that Mr. James Robinson had expressed to him the same idea. To neither of these men was encouragement given, neither was the suggestion discouraged. The conversations with these men transpired prior to Mr. Berry's announcement that the lumbermen were desirous of contributing to the fund which was afterwards raised. It is apparent that Hon. Mr. Flemming did not discourage such a movement but he warned Berry not to have anything to do with getting or receiving the money. The Premier named the treasurer, Mr. Teed of Woodstock. He knew that efforts were being made to get moneys from certain holders of Crown Timber Licenses, he knew that from time to time such moneys were coming into Mr. Teed's hands. He set his seal of approval on the transaction by introducing his chosen treasurer to Mr. Brankley with the words: "Anything Mr. Berry tells you about this man (Teed) will be all right." At the time of such remark, the Premier, with Messrs. Berry, Teed and Brankley, was in a room at the Barker House in Fredericton and Berry had acquainted him with the fact that Brankley was acting for the lumbermen in holding the fund prior to its being passed over.

FLEMMING KNEW OF IT.

In conclusion the report says: Having in mind, while it clearly appears that the fund was raised with the knowledge and consent of Mr. Flemming the vital question in this enquiry is: Did Mr. Flemming through the agency of Berry extort these moneys from the said lessees of Crown Lands? The evidence does not convince us that he did, for as against the evidence and circumstances above mentioned from which such an inference might be drawn we have the positive and uncontradicted testimony of Mr. Flemming that he did not know or have any hint, knowledge or information that the contributions to said fund were otherwise than absolutely voluntary, which testimony we do not feel justified in totally casting aside and disbelieving.

Not being satisfied by the evidence that the Hon. Mr. Flemming is guilty of directing the extortion of said moneys by the said William H. Berry before the lands were classified, we therefore find him not guilty as charged.

There has been no evidence whatever to show that any other members of the Government had any knowledge of this fund or its collection; in fact, Mr. Flemming in his testimony clearly stated this, saying that he was the only member of the Government who had anything to do with the matter and that he had not consulted with his colleagues regarding it. The inference, therefore is clear that it was to be controlled and disbursed entirely by Mr. Teed and himself.

As to the disposition made by Berry of the moneys so extorted and the ultimate destination thereof, we beg to report that the total amount of seventy-one thousand, six hundred and sixty-four dollars, so raised, he the said Berry, retained in his possession sixteen thousand five hundred dollars, and the balance, being the sum of fifty-five thousand, one hundred and sixty-five dollars, has been paid over to E. R. Teed of Woodstock who was asked by Hon. Mr. Flemming to receive and hold the same. According to Mr. Teed's evidence he has paid from the funds some of the bills of the Local Government Party, also twelve dollars for safety boxes, two hundred dollars to Mr. Brankley for expenses and one thousand dollars for his own expenses in connection with the collection and handling of the fund. With the exceptions above noted the entire amount which was in Mr. Teed's possession at the time he gave evidence before the Commission, and he is now, or was then, holding the same as a fund to be used in the interests of the Local Government party in this Province.

TWO THOUSAND PRISONERS.

(Special Cable to The Mail.)
PETROGRAD, NOV. 20.—IN THE FIGHTING AT THORN, THE COSACKS TURNED THE RIGHT FLANK OF THE GERMAN FORCE AND COMPELLED ITS HURRIED RETREAT AND THE ABANDONMENT OF ALL CANNON AND AMMUNITION WAGONS. TWO THOUSAND GERMANS WERE TAKEN PRISONERS IN THE ACTION. IN BOTH THE NORTH AND THE SOUTH THE RUSSIANS HAVE MADE IMPORTANT ADVANCES IN THE LAST THREE DAYS. THE GERMANS HAVE BEEN FORCED BACK IN EAST PRUSSIA FROM WHICH THEY WITHDREW TROOPS TO STRENGTHEN GENERAL VON HINDENBERG'S ARMY.

A TURKISH REPORT.

London, Nov. 20.—An official statement given out by the Turkish War Office declares that the strongly fortified Russian position near Azet has been taken by the Turks by a bayonet charge at the end of two days' fighting.

SOLDIERS OPERATE RAILWAYS.

Paris, Nov. 20.—The Germans in Belgium are offering the Belgian railway employees from twelve to fifty francs (\$2.40 to \$10) a day to continue at their work. Despite these proffered wages the Germans are having difficulty in obtaining men to operate the railways and are having to detail members of the regular army to operate the lines of transport.

SERVIAN TROOPS WITHDRAWN.

Nish, Nov. 20.—Admission that Serbian troops have been withdrawn from Valievo is made in an official announcement. The Austrians, according to the statement, tried to prevent the movement but were repulsed by artillery fire by the Serbians.

FEELING FRENCH SENT BACK

London, Nov. 17.—After a long series of diplomatic negotiations no word of which ever appeared in the newspapers, Great Britain and France have settled the important and vexing problem of what to do with the thousands of French refugees who followed the Belgians to England from the devastated communities in the zone of war.

The total number of fugitives from northern France within two months is known only to British port authorities, but it is learned that it approximates 40,000. Practically all this mighty host has been sent back to France, which is quite able and eager to care for them.

England was wholly unprepared for this influx, and while the funds for the relief of the Belgian refugees were plentiful, there were none for the French. The French Government wouldn't provide money on a large scale for its citizens in England insisting that there was no necessity for them to leave France. Nevertheless, every channel boat from Calais carried hundreds of panic-stricken peasants who, finding transportation in their own country almost impossible, decided to flee to England.

The situation became daily more acute until within a few days the British and French Governments completed arrangements by which the French fugitives landing at the English port are detained there until they can be shipped to Havre, where they are met and transferred to receiving depots in various parts of France.

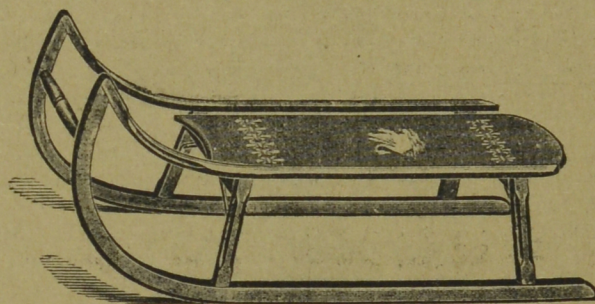
