THE N. T. R. SCANDAL

(Continued from page one.)

Some questions answered in the house today by the government add further light. Hon. Frank Cochrane told Hon. George Graham that the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company had not approved of the changes in grade made on the N. T. R. since the Borden government came into office.

Mr. Cochrane also told Mr. Graham that the estimated cost of the mountain section of the Grand Trunk Pacific according to the chief engineer of the company was \$102,775 per mile while the cost of the mile of the prairie section was estimated at \$45,180. Compared with these figures the average cost per mile of the National Transcontinental, which is less than \$90,000 including stations and everything complete, would not appear to be so very unreasonable. Compared with the main line of the C. P. R. and with the American Railways, the figure is low.

Hon. Mr. Cochrane told H. N. Chas. Murphy that the Hudson Bay Railway a little over four hundred miles in length, was all under contract to one contractor, J. D. McArthur. In addition to that the information was given that the Welland Canal contracts, aggregating over \$20,000,000 had been let to four firms.

Apparently, the policy of letting out contracts for large sections of railway at once, or for canal construction where the amounts involved are away up in the millions is all right when done by the present government, but is all wrong if done by the Liberal government.

Messrs. Guthrie and Lynch-Staunton in their report declared that the letting of the contracts on the National Transcontinental to a few big firms shut out the smaller contractors and resulted in swindling and a consequent "rake-off" of \$8,000,000.

TORONTO EXPRESS DITCHED, ENGINEER KILLED

Mountain, Ont., Feb. 18--Racing along on the way from Toronto to Montreal at a speed of forty miles an hour, a C.P.R. passenger train was wrecked here on Tuesday afternoon. The engine turned a complete somersault, the engineer, Robert Grant of Montreal, being found dead later with his hand still clutching the throttle. His fireman, J. Anderson of Smith's Falls, was shot through the cap of the engine and fell in a field adjacent with his face and hands badly cut. D. Weaver, the baggage man, was scratched too. The only passenger hurt was Mr. E. Bowles of 219 Broadway, New York, who was cut about the face and hands. The injured were all removed to their homes within a few hours after the accident, while the body of the dead engineer was taken to Montreal.

The train was tearing along at a rate of forty miles an hour when it struck a broken rail thirty miles west of Smith's Falls. The engine shot into the air while the heavy cars that were in the train plunged from the tracks. The great mogul turned almost a complete somersault before it hit the ground. With an awful crashing the cars piled upon it.

Farmers working near the track saw the accident. They ran to the phones and called doctors and help and sent word to the proper railway officials. The wreckers were soon on the scene and cleared the line so that the traffic was resumed.

Fortunately there were not many passengers on the wrecked train. These however, passed through a thrilling experience. Clutching frantically at their seats they attempted to save themselves as the coaches plunged along the right of way. There was a terrible plunging along the ties; then the crash of the wreck. Bowles was hurled between two seats and cut and bruised severely. Most passengers were very cool, although one gentleman lost his nerve and had to be dragged out of the upturned cars when the train had stopped. The train was in charge of Conductor Munro of Westmount.

The engineer who was killed lived at 51 Orchard avenue, Montreal. He was one of the oldest employees of the railway, having served thirty-four years on the rail. He is survived by a widow and a grown-up family, all of whom are married. He was sixty years of age.

THE ANIMALS' HEALTH

Dwellers in the Toronto Zoo-Make Good Patients

"A long way the healthiest animals here," said Mr. F. Goode, superintendent of the Riverdale Zoo, Toronto, "is the elephant. We have had her about ten years, and she has only been sick or sorry once in the last five years, and then she had only a slight cold."

Speaking generally, Mr. Goode was of the opinion that the denizens of the Zoo made good patients. The great majority of them, he was convinced, are more insensible to pain than are human beings. And they have nothing like the same apprehension of death or suffering. To this rule, however, he made some exceptions. A sick monkey, he said, was one of the most pitiful sights of the world. To see a monkey die was pitiful in the extreme. It showed just the same kind of feelings as a human being does.

"I should say that the leopard is the most delicate of the animals we have here. He has a shorter coat than either the lion or the tiger, and a cold wind affects him. We lost a leopard two years ago from pneumonia. That is really the chief disease of which we stand in dread. On the whole we are extremely free from illness at the Zoo."

"Black and brown bears give very little trouble. They are naturally strong. And when they are feeling not quite up to the mark, they will drink cod liver oil freely out of a cup. Beavers are healthy, as well as industrious. But they fight like fury where a male and female are to get together, and have a family, and found a colony, they are all right. But put in a strange beaver among this colony, and they will kill him inside of twenty-four hours. They will cut his tail off, and tear holes in his back. And all this will be done under water. Beavers can stand any amount of pain. I have known a beaver badly mauled, and gangrene set in until half of him was really dead. And yet he would still keep on diving."

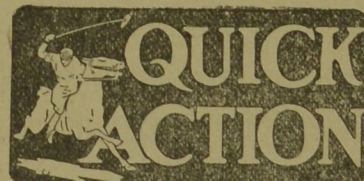
