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LORD ROSEBERRY'S VIEWS

Lord Roseberry has come far enough out of his "lonely furrow" to give some of his opinions about the war. Speaking at Edinburgh not long ago, at a meeting to encourage recruits, he said:

"The doctrine is that might is right that as long as you have a sufficiently large army, to which has recently been added a sufficiently large navy, you can do whatever you like. There is no right or wrong. In the ethics of the world might is right. When that comes to be the principle of Europe, when that comes to be the principle which over-rides treaties and regards them as scraps of paper, the world has got very near to damnation. That doctrine had been a curse to Prussia, a curse to Germany, and a curse to the surrounding nations, who had been obliged to tax the sweat and blood of their people to an incredible extent in order to maintain armaments. Might, according to the new philosophy of Germany, meant universal domination. No voice would be raised in Europe without the approbation of Prussia and every state would practically be the vassal of Prussia. In the time of Prince Bismarck, who was a wise and cautious statesman, the policy of Prussia was restrained, but the persons who had taken his place and discarded him were determined to put the German empire to the hazard of war in order to acquire a universal domination. What was the benefit which they proposed to grant to their new subjects? It was German culture. We have heard all our lives of German culture as a something to which poor Scotchmen and Englishmen could not aspire," said Lord Roseberry. "It was on a higher level than our lives. They have, I think, more than forty universities in Germany, a good poultry yard for laying the eggs of German culture. Now, what was that German culture? What was its object and its practice? Its first object seemed to be, inspired, he supposed, by the forty universities, to destroy all other universities, and they had begun by destroying the University of Louvain which by solemn treaty they had sworn to preserve. The second object was to drown Belgium, which they had guaranteed by a solemn act in blood and in fire, and the third was to destroy all historical monuments within their reach and to do what the greatest barbarians in history would never even have contemplated."

Pity Lord Roseberry doesn't get roused a little oftener, if he can always speak like this. He is a brilliant example of a man who can pack more truth into what he says than any other man alive but doesn't often enough take the trouble.

The German Cruiser Emden, which has been a menace to British commerce in the Pacific Ocean has been driven ashore and burned. It was not a dreadnought of the North Sea fleet which did the trick, but a fast cruiser belonging to His Majesty's Australian navy.

It is rumored that the Suburban service on the I.C.R. between Marysville and Fredericton is to be discontinued after this week. General Manager Gutelius evidently believes that a town that votes Tory like Marysville deserves to walk.

MR. H. J. LOGAN HERE.

Mr. H. J. Logan, ex-M.P. for Cumberland, N.S., arrived in the city last evening and is a guest at the Queen. Mr. Logan represented Cumberland in parliament for twelve years and established a reputation as an able parliamentarian and is generally recognized as one of the most efficient campaign speakers in Canada. He did some missionary work in this county during the federal campaign of 1903, addressing a great meeting at the Opera House in the interests of Mr. N. W. Brown, the Liberal candidate. Mr. Logan is here on private business and expects to leave for Chatham this evening.

TURKISH EMPIRE HAS COMMITTED SUICIDE

was decorated with the flags and the coats-of-arms of the allied nations, the enthusiasm knew no bounds, the entire assembly rising to welcome them. The military men, including Lord Kitchener, wore service uniforms of khaki; the ambassadors and other diplomats were in the brilliant uniforms of their rank.

After the formal toast to the king and royal family had been proposed, ex-Premier Arthur J. Balfour proposed "The Allies."

He emphasized that the toast was without precedent, but, he added: "We are living in times that are also without precedent, when the whole world is either in arms or in anxious expectation."

Japan, continued Mr. Balfour, had made one of the most drastic answers, by the capture of Tsing Tau, to the most insolent message ever sent by one sovereign to another—that which seventeen years ago compelled Japan to give up Port Arthur which she had taken from the Chinese.

The ex-premier spoke in glowing terms of the gallantry of the Russian army, the powers of organization displayed by Grand Duke Nicholas and the remorseless speed with which Russia had carried out her movements. Here, one success after another might be looked for, and as for the west, the memory of the days when the French and British fought side by side against the enemy of civilization would never be forgotten.

Mr. Balfour also spoke of Serbia, which was prepared to give up everything short of national existence to keep peace, and of Belgium whose history was even more tragic. Belgium had been over-run by the Germans for no cause except expediency of war. Cynicism could go no further in politics, and we denounced the reckless and brutal militarism inflicted upon a civil population.

Belgium, he declared, would be restored to all, and more, of her ancient prosperity by the Allies who were bound together by the pursuit of one great object, and there was no danger of misadventure, for no mean or petty motive actuated any of them.

"We are five nations," said the ex-premier in conclusion, "and we fight not for ourselves alone, but for civilization and for all small states who seek to follow their own ideals, without interference from an unauthorized and insolent aggressor."
