at present and he had been expected to attend the meeting but had wired that he could not come. It was then arranged that an appointment be made with Mr. Kennedy and Mr. Sherwood and the executive called together to discuss the situation with them.

It was also moved by Mr. Randolph and seconded by Mr. Hodge, that the secretary write to Mr. Gutelius, and ask him for an appointment with the executive before the service was arranged on the new Valley Railway.

Mr. Campbell moved, seconded by Mr. Chestnut, that the president call up Mr. Gutelius and find out if there was any truth in the report that the suburban service between Fredericton and Marysville was about to be discontinued.

A letter was read from the St. John Board of Trade asking the Fredericton Board to support a movement to have an Atlantic British-owned cable between England and Canada. It was moved by Mr. Randolph and seconded by Mr. Campbell, that the matter be laid on the table until further information was secured.

A telegram from Mr. Hazen, acting minister of militia, was read, in which the matter of Fredericton's recruiting station was dealt with.

A communication from the Port Arthur Board of Trade was read, in which the local Board was asked to take action on a resolution to promote the establishment of government loans to urban and rural municipalities, on condition that the loans be used in clearing and bringing under cultivation additional land or in extending the area under market gardening. The paper pointed out that New Zealand has loaned to farmers in this way \$65,000,000, Australia, \$80,000,000; Argentine Republic, \$50,000,000, and Great Britain to the tenant farmers of Ireland over \$330,000,000. It was suggested that Canada should establish for this purpose a loan of \$50,000,000.

Mr. C. Fred Chestnut spoke on the matter and said that to his mind it was very important that in the present situation every effort should be made to bring under cultivation as much land as possible, since the national debt was increasing and our only large source of revenue was the land. He moved, seconded by Mr. Slipp, that the resolution be left in the hands of a committee composed of the president, Mr. G. W. Harrison and Mr. Brooks, to bring in a report at the next meeting.

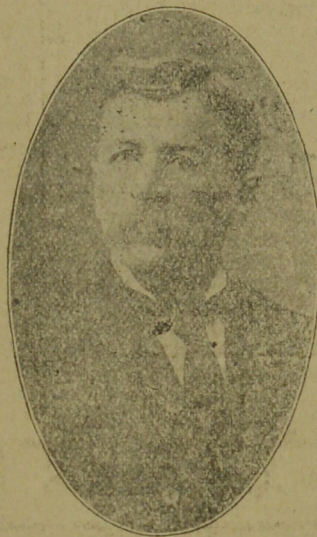

Douglas of Amherst, Peter Clinch Charles E. Oak and J. Fraser Gregory of St. John, and Allan Ritchie of Newcastle.

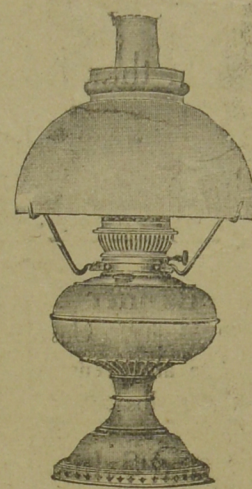
