## MIXING OF RACES

It Adds to the Vigor of the Individual

The old idea was that a race gained in vigor by its purity of strain, says Dr. Woods Hutchinson. This is a delusion, and the purer a race strain is the less vigorous the members of the race will be. There is no such thing as a pure race. Every race on the face of the earth has been mixing with others for thousands of years. The mixing of races adds to their vigor, provided, of course, the two strains have good blood. There is no such thing as an older race. We in America are as old as any people in the world, only our recent development has been under a different environment. Mixing of race is going on constantly in Europe as it is over here, but not on so large a scale. The regions where there is the most mixing of races are the regions that produce the greatest men.

There is not much difference between the various races. If you went into a gymnasium, for instance, where men from all the civilized white races were dressed alike and none of them spoke a word, it would be hard to distinguish the men from England and America from those from France, Germany or Italy. The clew we have now to the different races is mostly in the clothes and manners and language.

## ONTARIO'S METAL MINES

Mining is an Important Industry of the Province

Metal mining has become a great industry in Ontario. Gold, silver, nickel and copper are produced in large quantities.

For some years the nickel-copper mines of the Sudbury district have been widely known as the world's chief source of nickel and important producers of copper. Since the original discovery in 1903 the silver mines at Cobalt have placed Ontario in a prominent position as a producer of silver. The deposits are remarkably rich and the profit has been unusually large, amounting to about one-half of the value of the silver. The production is at the rate of over 30,000,000 ounces per year. The discovery of gold in the Porcupine district resulted in the development of several profitable mines.

There are many miles of territory in Northern Ontario concerning which scarcely anything is known. There are large areas which have been described by explorers as promising, but as yet unprospected. There is every indication that many important ore deposits will be found in the Province and that the mining industry will continue to grow.

A German professor says that the average man contains fat worth \$2.50, enough iron to make a nail, phosphorus enough for the heads of 2,200 matches, enough magnesium for some respectable fireworks, albumen equal to eggs, sugar and salt. The continuous cold weather and good going has been the means of a large number of men cutting firewood which is daily being hauled to Fredericton.

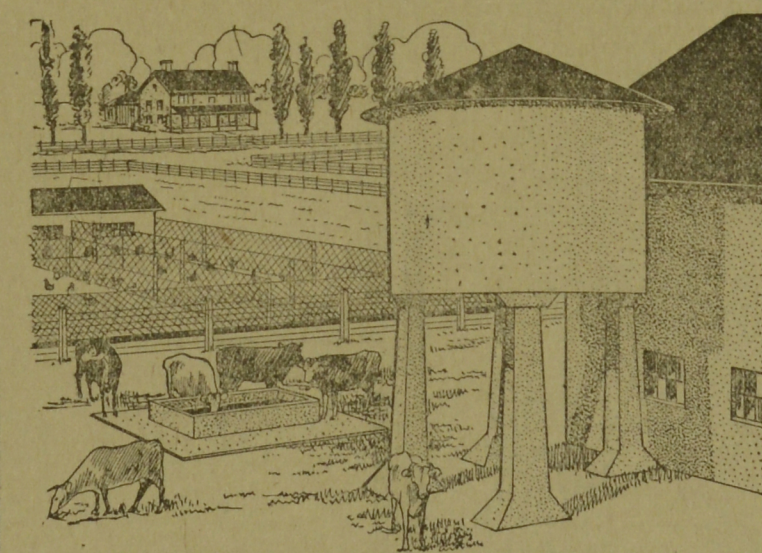
Mrs. William Rickard who has been in St. John the past four days is home again, after having spent a very pleasant time.

ILL IN LONELY SHACK,  
PERISHES OF THE COLD

North Bay, Feb. 22—Two boys, sons of a farmer named Jodouin, living near Sandy Falls, on Sturgeon river, north of Sturgeon Falls seven miles, while out hunting yesterday along the right-of-way of the C.N.R. under construction, found the dead body of a man in a railway camp building. The body was lying in a bunk, frozen stiff, and was later identified as that of Thomas Parkes, an employee of the C.N.R., in charge of the water-rank at Sandy Falls for construction engines.

Parkes was about thirty years of age and was a sergeant in the British army before coming to this country. He is said to be well connected in England. He returned to his post last Tuesday after coming out to Sturgeon Falls for supplies, and that was the last seen of him alive. He is supposed to have taken sick in his lonely cabin, which was several miles from any other habitation, and unable to keep the fire going in the intense cold, caused his death from freezing.
