SOUTHAMPION MAN CALLED TO HIS REWARD

Southampton, Dec. 8-Mrs. Maria R. Fox, relict of the late John W. Fox, died at her home here on Thursday, the 3rd inst., in the murety-

seventh year of her age.
She was born in Jacksontown, Carleton county, on May 6th, 1818, and therefore was exactly ninety-six years six months and twenty-seven days old She was the daughter of the late Samuel Freeman, who settled in this country during the Revolutionary war. She could distinctly remember when Woodstock consisted of only two or three small huts and one small store. Upper Woodstock (then called Hard Scrabble) was only two or three miles from her home.

Her home here has always been among the mojt hospital in the province and no stranger, with or without money, ever went hungry from

Her husband died forty-eight years ago in Houlton, Me., where he had gone on business. He left a family of nine children, the youngest only one year old. With commendable pride and great industry Mrs.; Fox fought the battle of life and brought up her young family until all of them have made good citizens.
Six children survive her, all of

whom attended her funeral. These are: Amasa C., with whom shelived, and who gave her the greatest care Samuel B., of Temperance Vale; John W., who lives near the homestead; Mrs. William Munroe of Lower Southampton, Mrs. Amos Freeman of Hartford, Carleton county, and Mrs. Jas. T. Martin, wife of the ex-zouncillor, of

Campbell Settlement, York county. The funeral, which was largely attended, was held in the United Baptist church here. Rev. Mr. Rutledge officiated.
