Mrs. James Patterson has been visiting friends at Wiggins Mills.

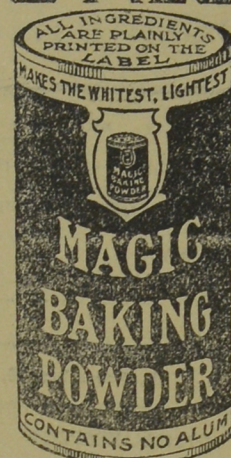
Mrs. J. Barton has been very ill with erysipitis but we are glad to say that she is recovering.

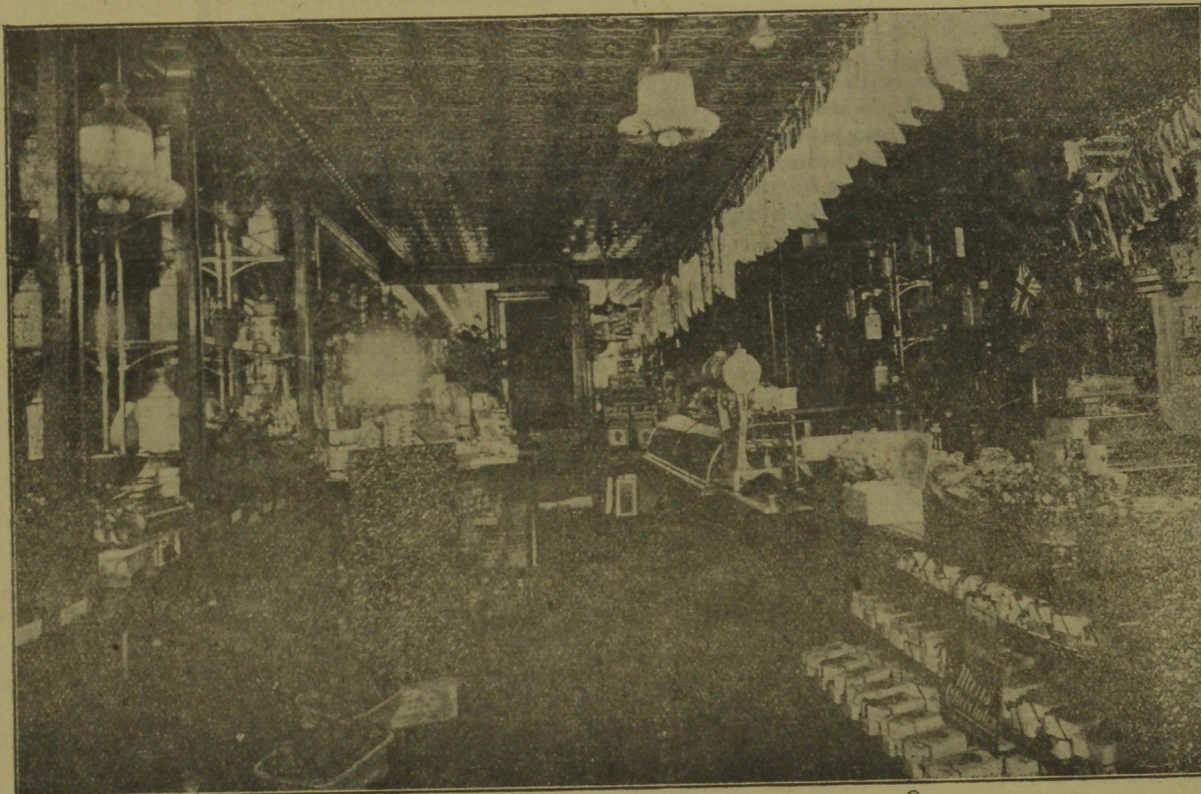
