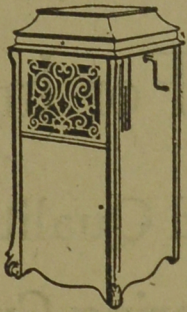

BORDEN GOVERNMENT

HEAVY BORROWERS

Ottawa, March 5.—A return tabled in the commons this afternoon by the finance minister shows that during the calendar year 1912-13 Canadian loans in the London market have totalled approximately \$60,000,000.

On Feb. 24, 1912, a 3½ per cent twenty year loan for \$5,000,000 was made. The issue was made at 98 and the amount realized was \$4,922,360. The effective interest rate on the proceeds is 3.8 per cent.

On Sept. 25, 1913, a four per cent. long term loan was made for \$3,000,000. The issue was made at 99 and the amount realized was \$2,973,606. The effective interest rate is 4.2 per cent.

On December 3 last a loan was placed with the underwriters for \$4,000,000 at four per cent. Word received from London today states that some 22 per cent of this loan has been taken up, and 78 per cent of it

London, March 6.—Plans for the state visit which King George and Queen Mary are to pay to President Poincaré in Paris next month are rapidly nearing completion. The trip across the channel will be made in the royal yacht Victoria and Albert. The royal yacht will be in charge of Commander George Tomlin, who was navigating commander of the steamship Medina when she conveyed Their Majesties to India for the Dabar. still left on the hands of the underwriters. The finance minister estimates that the net amount to be realized will be \$3,791,851 and the effective interest rate is placed at 4.352 per cent.

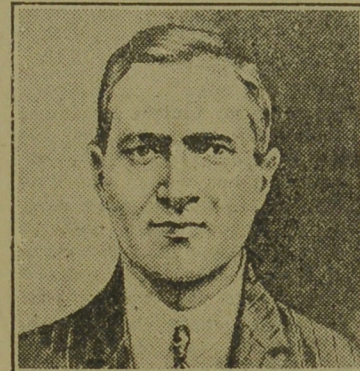

The fire broke out at about two o'clock Thursday afternoon being first noticed on the roof near the chimney. Then it was too late to fight effectively as the greater portion of the attic was in flames. The high wind prevailing at the time fanned the blaze so that in an hour and a half the building was completely consumed. A CONFERENCE ON

PRISON REFORM

New York, March 6.—Superintendents and wardens of prisons in various parts of the United States and Canada addressed a conference here today in the interest of prison reform. The meeting was held under the auspices of the Women's Department of the National Civic Federation and was the first of a series of such meetings to be held in various parts of the country with a view to creating public sentiment in favor of legislation for prison reform and to formulate a definite program of legislative action.

RAYS CAUSE EXPLOSION

IN GUNPOWDER

Paris, March 5.—The European naval powers are much interested in reports of the secret trial said to have been made recently at Florence of the invention of Signor Olivi, the discoverer of rays which explode gunpowder at a distance. According to the reports, four torpedoes, two containing white and two containing black gunpowder, were submerged in the Arno river. On receiving a signal Signor Olivi, who was stationed on a tower of the Palazzo Capponi, started his apparatus and within a minute all the torpedoes exploded. The Italian government has secured the invention.

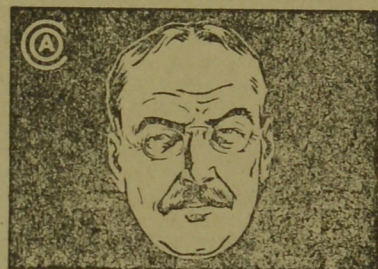
