## BELGIAN RELIEF STEAMER LEAVES HALIFAX

Halifax, N. S., Dec. 20.—The third Belgian relief steamer left Halifax Saturday afternoon carrying food and supplies for the Belgian people. The steamer is the Calcutta, and the bulk of her cargo was from Montreal and included 112,000 bushels of wheat, 20,000 bags and barrels of flour, general provisions and 100 cases of clothing.

Shortly before the steamer sailed E. B. Elderkin, in Rotterdam, representing the Nova Scotia government, cabled that there was great need of milk for the Belgians. The Nova Scotia committee at once purchased 1,600 cases in Truro and had it rushed to Truro and placed aboard.

When an inquest was held at Cleethorpes, G.B., on James McKie, fifty-seven, civil engineer, who was found dead with wounds in his throat, self-inflicted, it was shown in medical evidence that he took a pessimistic view of the war and was obsessed with the idea that Zeppelins were coming to drop bombs on Cleethorpes.

**TO ESTABLISH****PLANT IN CANADA**

Stamford, Conn., December, 18.—The John Davenport Foundry Company is establishing a branch plant in Montreal, Canada, where, according to Benjamin Ogden, manager of the local plant, it is starting upon an extensive order for its Canadian trade thus escaping paying duty on the goods were they manufactured in the United States.

It sidesteps a duty of 27½ per cent. and as it is expected that the Canadian plant will be maintained for a period of ten years, at least, the saving will be considerable.

After the war is over the company expects to establish plants in Europe probably in Norway and Sweden first.

Mr. Ogden declines to state the kind of goods to be manufactured.

The company here is making a specialty of piano-plate manufacture.

## MOVING PICTURES WITHOUT A SCREEN

Invention of a German "Movie" Man  
Turned Out a Success

Some five years ago a German experimenter, Herr Messter, discovered that if moving pictures were projected by reflection in a certain manner, the stage could be set with scenery and properties, as for a regular play, with the result that the usual white screen could be eliminated, and that the photographic figures could be moved about within a certain area in such a manner as to convey the illusion that living performers were seen instead of photographic reproductions. He was faced with the initial difficulty that only small figures could be projected, and this fact tended to destroy the illusion, since to maintain the latter, life-size portrayal of the performers was imperative.

Another complexity which troubled him was the destruction of the coloring qualities owing to the high light necessary. This latter problem was overcome by utilizing pierrots and clowns, in which only black and white dress and make-up were required. Such a limitation was a handicap, but nevertheless, when such pictures were shown, considerable interest and wonder as to how the effects were obtained were aroused. The fact that the figures were dwarfish, and yet apparently endowed with life, enhanced the mysterious effect. By patient experimenting the inventor at last overcame the latter deficiency, and having succeeded in getting his figures life size, public exhibitions were given in Vienna with great success. Singing and talking effects are obtained by electrically synchronizing a talking machine with the acting.

**CURIOUS FISH**

Some Finny Creatures Croak; Some Hum and One Shrieks

Fishes have often been referred to as "voiceless, emotionless creatures," but scientific investigation has demonstrated that like land animals they are largely swayed by the same emotions, and that in a limited way they give expression thereto. There are more than 300 species of fish which are known to produce sound. One particular kind of fish, which are called "maigres," emit sound having a duration of about twenty-five seconds, and also various notes usually degenerating into a mere humming, either from excess or want of intensity. When these fish are travelling in shoals the sounds given out by them may be heard from a depth of twenty fathoms. More than once it has been suggested that the story of the sirens had its origin in the utterances of these fish.

When captured, the sea, or horse mackerel, the globe fish, the grunt, the pig-fish, and the hog-fish all emit sounds resembling the grunt of a pig while one, well known along the Atlantic coast as the croaker, derives its name from the croak it gives when taken into a boat. The barbel and the carp also croak when taken from the water.

There is a species of "sea-drug" found by the natives of Malabar, an so-called on account of the noise it makes when captured. The real name has been dubbed the "sea-croak" by reason of its crowing. The mado, a fish found in the Rio Parana, is most remarkable for the harsh grating sound it emits when caught with hook and line. It is said that this noise can be heard distinctly while the fish is yet beneath the surface.

There is a fish in the Tagus that emits sounds resembling the vibrations of a deep-toned bell, gong, or pedal pipe of an organ. Herring when the net has been drawn round them, have been observed to do the same, and similar accounts are given of the river bullhead. An amphibious silurid fish, on being taken into the hand, is said to shriek, and certain of the blennies emit similar sounds. In the Gulf of Mexico the big jewfish breaks the stillness of the night and the waters with his sonorous "boom! boom!"

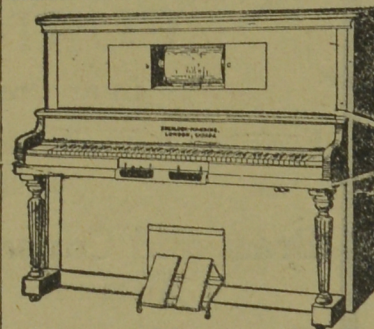
