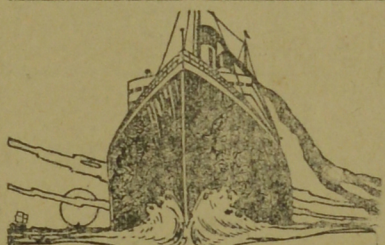

OFFICERS GRAPHIC STORY OF LAST NAVAL BATTLE

London, Oct. 23.—The first good description of the sea fight last Friday which resulted in the sinking of four German destroyers by the British cruiser Undaunted and the torpedo-boat destroyers Lance, Lennox, Legion and Loyal, is given by an officer of the Undaunted.

"When heading northward," the officer said, "we saw the smoke of four men's vessels. The captain immediately ordered us to clear for action and to chase them. We steamed at top speed with the destroyers in pursuit of the Germans. It was an unforgettable sight. Our nerves were strained and everybody was as keen as mustard over our luck.

"The Germans turned about and fled, but we had the advantage in speed and soon they were in range of our six-inch bow-chasers. Seeing themselves cornered the Germans altered their course and got a better strategic position and answered our fire, aiming mostly at our destroyers. 'Lusty cheers rang from our ships as the first German destroyer disappeared. A shell struck her just below the bridge and she toppled over on her beam ends like a wounded bird, then righted herself to a level with the surface and finally plunged bow first beneath the waves. It was all over with her in two minutes.

"In less than an hour after we had sighted the Germans the second destroyer was out of action. She was ablaze fore and aft, showing what the fearful shell was doing. As one shell hit her the funnels, bridge, torpedo tubes and deck fittings all disappeared like magic.

"We actually passed over the spot where the first vessel was sunk, and for the space of a couple of seconds, as we tore through the water at a rate of over thirty knots an hour, we saw poor wretches floating, clinging to charred and broken debris and other wreckage. It was a pitiable sight, but we had two more combatants to put out of action.

"The second ship had sunk to the level of the water and we still had the remaining two-holed and maimed. Their firing was poor, though several of their shells flew around and cast shrapnel bullets about us.

"The enemy fired many torpedoes, one of them missing the Undaunted's stern by only a few yards.

"An hour and a half after the Germans were sighted all was over with them and the order was given to save life."

LAW AND JUSTICE.

COWARDICE OF THE GOVERNMENT OVER COMMISSION'S REPORT

(St. John Telegraph.) The Conservative strategy board was in session here yesterday. Its deliberations were uncommonly troubled because of the hovering presence of Premier J. K. Flemming. The strategists met to decide what to do with Mr. Flemming and it is reported that he and several other stalwarts insisted that the thing to do with him is to go to the country under his leadership. This, of course, would be resisted by some Conservatives, but whether Mr. Flemming's colleagues are in a position to throw him overboard is just a question. He is awkward enough as a shipmate, but he might be even more awkward as an enemy; he might, in the court phrase, "turn state's evidence."

We must assume that Mr. Flemming the attorney general, and other members and advisers of the government, are now familiar with the contents of the report of the Royal Commission on the Dugal charges. The public, which has not seen the report, is familiar with the evidence heard in open court and widely published, and the public knows what the commission's verdict ought to be. The public's verdict is ready and the public will record it emphatically enough when the time comes.

But for the cowardice of the government the public would have had the Dugal commission's report before today. The government pretends that it has not had time to consider the report. It has had plenty of time.

For that matter, it is not necessary that the government should "consider" the report before the public has had it. The report should be given the utmost publicity as soon as possible. Instead of facilitating that end, the government continues to conceal the report while its members discuss their own fate. They do not care about the public interest if by hook or by crook they can discover some way in which to diminish the effect of the Dugal disclosures upon their own personal fortunes. Their troubles are sharpened by Mr. Flemming, who insists in trying to climb into the boat, which the others know already to be sinking.

The attorney general and his associates, who have really little or nothing to do, deceive nobody by 'keeping up the foolish pretence that they have not had time to consider the Dugal report. The public, remembering what the evidence was, realizing the size of the hole the Conservative party is in, recognizes the futility of the government's attempt to get from under. The report must be given to the public. It is impudent to withhold it. The report deals with matters which are of far greater public importance than the political life of any politician or any government. What possible excuse can these politicians give the people of New Brunswick for keeping it back?
