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THE CENSOR ON BLONDIN

Referring to the appointment of Hon. P. E. Blondin to the Borden cabinet and the discreet silence of the Conservative press in connection therewith the Ottawa Free Press says:

Where is the applause of the Conservative press for the elevation of Deputy Speaker Blondin to cabinet rank? A careful examination of journals whose life rule has been to approve of all the actions of Sir Robert Borden fails to reveal either endorsement or condemnation of the latest prize package he has handed the country. The Mail and Empire entirely neglects to refer in approving terms to the appointment. The Toronto Telegram fails to recall Mr. Blondin's famous remark about "shooting holes in the Union Jack to breathe the air of freedom." The Montreal Star only expresses the pious hope that Mr. Blondin will do better in the future than he did in the past. This is the best thing that can be found in the government press on the newest member of the administration. The Montreal Gazette in a column article on the cabinet changes, dismisses Blondin in a line and a half with the remark that he may exercise some influence in the country. The Ottawa Journal is dumb. The other Government mouthpieces appear to have buried Blondin in so profound silence that the admission of that veteran, Hon. T. Chase Casagrain, to the sacred council has also almost been obscured.

We do not think this is fair to Mr. Blondin. It is true that some of the Government organs refer to the fact that Mr. Blondin has not been tried, but not one of them has had the courage to declare that he has not been convicted.

Is there anything wrong about this Cabinet shuffle? If there is, the country is entitled to learn it from those who should know what it is. At least the people should be told why Mr. Blondin was made an adviser to His Royal Highness, the Governor General.

Mr. Rogers has gone to Winnipeg, Premier Borden is off to the United States, and Mr. Blondin is now helping to guide the destinies of the country in a time of stress.

The situation is uncomfortable for the thoughtful, and exasperating to the curious. The temper of the people should not be tried in this way. Unless it is against the rules of the censor, for the safety of the state, we should be told. Let there be light.

CHANGE IN I. C. R. TRAINS

Chatham World.—It is said that Chatham Junction will be abandoned on the completion of the Nelson diversion, that the Fredericton express will run to Newcastle and that Loggieville and Chatham passengers and freight to and from all points will first go to Newcastle. This will lengthen the distance considerably to all points south and to Fredericton, increase the fares, and compel passengers to make an earlier start in the morning. The report that Chatham is to be a flag station is not correct.

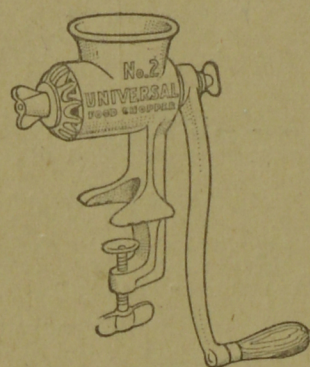
