"The Germans are digging entrenchments in the direction of Thielt, behind the line of Nieuport-Dixmude."

### NOBLEMEN'S NAMES IN CASUALTY LIST.

London, Oct. 29. —A casualty list dated October 24 and October 27, issued tonight, gives the names of twenty-three officers killed, forty-eight wounded and seventeen missing. Among the killed are Captain the Hon. Charles Henry Stanley Monck, of the Coldstream Guards, heir of Viscount Monck, and Lt.-Col. W. L. Loring, of the Royal Warwickshire Regiment.

In the list of wounded appear the names of Major Lord Charles Gordon-Lennox, of the Scots Guards, second son of the Duke of Richmond; Lt.-Col. G. P. T. Fielding of the Coldstream Guards; Brevet Lt.-Col. C. C. Stewart of the Royal Field Artillery, and Lt.-Col. Hugh Davis White-Thomson, of the Royal Horse Artillery.

### INVASION OF KAMERUN.

Paris, October 29. —A despatch to the Havas Agency from Bordeaux says:

"A report received here from General Dohell, commanding the French forces operating against the German Kamerun, West Africa, says that two Franco-English columns occupied Edou Oct. 25 after serious fighting, in which the allied troops showed great bravery.

"Edou is an important railroad station on the Salanga, ninety miles from the coast."

### ADVANCE DELAYED.

Petrograd, October 29, via London: —The correspondent of the Retch at Lemberg says that Lemberg says that as a result of the burning of the villages on the lower regions of the San River frightful conditions prevail. All the available buildings including the Slavic monasteries, are crowded with Austrian wounded and dying. Many of these men, the correspondent says, were left behind by the fleeing Austrians without having received any medical attention.

"The Russian advance was delayed continues the correspondent, owing to the necessity of attending to the burning of the Austrian dead and caring for the wounded, who had fared badly at the hands of a few unskilled nurses and priests. The wounded deserted by the Austrians materially augmented the list of prisoners taken. Among the prisoners are many Turkish inhabitants of Bosnia.

"Polish volunteer regiments are being formed in all parts of Poland and western Russia, exclusively of Catholics. They are officered by Poles, and have Polish chaplains."

## U. N. B. HAD WALK-OVER AT SACKVILLE

Sackville, N.B., Oct. 29.—The U. N. B. team, with a large following of rooters arrived by special train today, and on the old campus which had seen so many glorious victories for the purple and gold, the huskies from the capital swept the field and carried off the day with glowing honors, score 28 to 0, establishing an event which will go down for years in the annals of U.N.B. The players and fans were in ecstasy over the result of the game of the year, and held demonstrations about the town.

The field was thronged with spectators and intense interest was displayed for the enthusiasts have been waiting throughout the season for these two teams to clash. The U.N.B. athletes literally swept the field in mass style and even the supporters of the local team could not resist expressing their admiration for the work. In the first half it was all U. N. ## BATTENBERG RESIGNS FROM THE ADMIRALTY

London, Oct. 29.—Prince Louis of Battenberg, first sea lord of the British admiralty, has resigned.

His resignation is said to be due to the campaign in some of the newspapers against him because of his German connections.

Prince Louis of Battenberg is an admiral and personal aide de camp to the King. He was born at Gratz, Austria, in 1854, the eldest son of Prince Alexander of Hesse. He married his cousin, Princess Victoria, daughter of Louis IV., grand duke of Hesse, and of Princess Alice, Queen Victoria's daughter. He was naturalized a British subject and entered the royal navy in 1868.

By marriage Prince Louis is related to Emperor William of Germany, the emperor being the eldest son of Queen Victoria's eldest daughter. The wife of Prince Louis is sister to the Russian Empress and cousin to the German Emperor.

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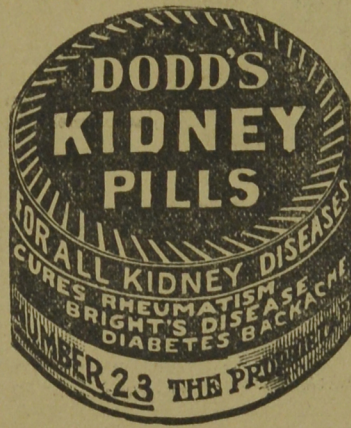
## HONEY STATISTICS

Living Conditions Favorable For Bees  
Worwers and Food Plentiful

For the purposes of reporting on the condition of bees in Ontario and the honey crop prospects blanks are sent to a large number of beekeepers. The Department of Agriculture. A thousand replies are received, on average, from which reports are summarized.

The total number of colonies reported according to last figures about 41,318, being an average of colonies, spring count, for each beekeeper reporting. The winter loss about 7½ per cent. What losses there are during the winter are due principally to starvation caused by lack of sufficient feed in the hives.

So far as the condition of bees concerned, the prospects for a good honey crop this year are very good but clover is only in a fair condition having been very much injured many localities by unfavorable weather conditions.
