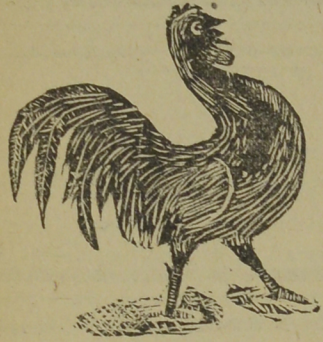

**GOLDEN EXPRESSION OF
A GOLDEN SENTIMENT**

Ottawa, Jan. 30.—In the presence of nearly all the Liberal members of Parliament gathered in the Opposition room on the Commons side, Mr. Fred Congdon, ex-M. P. for the Yukon presented to Sir Wilfrid Laurier this afternoon the unique birthday gifts of the Yukon Liberals to the Liberal leader.

Mr. Congdon first read an address declaring the esteem and affection of his followers in the Northland for ex-Premier. The address was contained in a moose-skin case with a miners pick, shovel and gold pan scorched upon and outside. Reality was lent to the picture by the fact that a shower of genuine gold nuggets are being spilled from the pan.

BIRTHDAY PRESENTS

As little birthday presents there was a golden inkwell with a fringe of nuggets about the top. There was also a paper cutter of solid gold from end to end weighing about a pound. On the handle was worked out a Northern scene in raised gold. A platinum river winds down between hills of solid gold in varied shades with clumps of spruce growing about their feet, while the Midnight Sun is rising above them. There are miners cabins along the river, and a big moose is moving down to investigate. The picture is framed in nuggets of generous dimensions.

GREETED WITH CHEERS

Sir Wilfrid, who was greeted by several moments of enthusiastic cheering, feelingly expressed his appreciation and asked Mr. Congdon to convey his most cordial sentiments to the Liberals of the Yukon Territory. He has been deeply touched during the past three months by the multitude of very substantial evidences of attachment for him, not personally, but as head of the Liberal party.

Continuing Sir Wilfrid happily characterized the gift as "the golden expression of a golden sentiment. Since the defeat of last autumn he had left as perhaps never before the

great warm heart of the Liberals of all Canada.

CONFIDENT AND COCKY

"After all" he observed, smiling "defeat has had for me many redeeming features." One cannot help but be moved by so many kind and affectionate evidences from those on every side. I have but one regret, that I am not so young as I used to be, but, though I am pretty old, there is still a kick or two left in the old body (laughter and cheers). We have our work to do and our friends know that, while we are not over sanguine, we are both confident and cocky. Looking at Parliament day in and day out a stranger looking on from the gallery would say: "the victors are not on the right side but on the left side of Mr. Speaker." We are having much more fun and ours is a much more happy lot than theirs."

HAVING LOTS OF FUN

"This is Tuesday, just one week ago now our boys were feeling very happy while the other fellows were disconsolate" continued Sir Wilfrid. "The Ne Temere decree debate did not contribute to make them happy and I am afraid we were wicked enough to enjoy their predicament and are wicked enough to enjoy the anticipation of other predicaments. By and by, however, we may get tired of having all the fun and may be called upon to take the responsibility too (applause). I don't say that we will be asked to do this today (laughter), or even tomorrow, but it may come the day after tomorrow. Having that it mind it should be our aim and our duty to prepare now while we are in the open to resume the good work for Canada which we did when we were in office."

At the conclusion of his short address the gathering gave three hearty cheers for the Liberal chief for the Liberals of the Yukon, and for Mr. Congdon, while the French Canadian members led in the strains of "O Canada."

**BRITISH SUBMARINE
BOAT SANK TO BOTTOM**

The submarine, which went out of the harbor this morning to carry out a series of diving and torpedo exercises, sank like a stone immediately after her collision with the gunboat Hazard.

A big escape of gas, which was observed on the surface immediately she sank, indicates that the gas quickly filled with water. The submarine lies on the Princess Shoal, almost on the same spot where the submarine "A 1" was lost with all hands on March 18, 1904.

Portsmouth, Feb. 2.—Torpedo practice had been in progress for some time and the submarine "A 3" was partially submerged when she came in collision with the gunboat Hazard.

The gunboat was steaming at a fairly high rate of speed and when she struck the submarine her bows cut a big rent in the little vessel's side. As the "A 3" settled down, which she did in a few minutes, and then disappeared, air and gas bubbles appearing on the surface told the crew of the Hazard that she was filling with water. It was practically certain that the fate of the two officers and nine men of which her crew was composed, was sealed. The Hazard, however, threw out life buoys and launched boats, in case any of the men should succeed in escaping but none of them came to the surface.

N. B. ESTIMATES CUT DOWN

An item of \$100,000 for Chatham and votes for wharves on the St. John River, and \$50,000 for a wharf for government steamers at St. John, had been dropped. The general vote for New Brunswick had thus been practically cut in two.

Hon. Mr. Monk said that very large provision had to be made for St. John this year, and there had to be economies in other directions. Because the item did not appear in the estimates this year it did not follow that the work would not go on from the general vote, or that the terms would appear later, renewing them.

Hon. Mr. Hazen intimated that he had taken over the task of obtaining a wharf for government steamers at St. John. His officers informed him that they had the money and the authority, and were now engaged in looking for a suitable wharf. He thought \$50,000 would not go far.

Dr. Pugsley said it was quite true the amount might be small if rumors he had heard about certain options were true. However, there was a report in the public works department made when he was minister, which showed where an excellent property could be obtained for that price.

Messrs. Monk and Hazen wanted to know why these works had not been done and the properties purchased last year.

Dr. Pugsley—"Because only seven-twelfths of the amount was voted."

Hon. Mr. Emmerson complained that votes for needed works in Westmorland County had been dropped, particularly that at Beaumont.

The New Brunswick list was voted and the House adjourned at midnight.
