NOVA SCOTIAN HEAD OF INTERNATIONAL MACHINISTS

Organized workers in Canada are taking much pride from the fact that Mr. William Hugh Johnston, the International President of the Association of Machinists and one of the leading labor men of the continent is a Canadian being born at West is a Canadian, being born at West-ville, Pictou County Nova Scotia, on December 30, 1874. He assumed the executive chair of the Machinist's Union this month after a gradual rise through the ranks, both as a work-man and as an organizer, his first experience in labor disputes being at the age of ten years when the boys at the mines in Nova Scotia were asking for better conditions.

From that time until the present day, he has been always advancing the interests of the workingman unil now he holds the highest position in the union of his trade. At the age of fourteen he was apprenticed in the locomotive works at Rhode Island, and in succeeding years was employed by different producers in the sea-board section, in 1895 he helped to organize his first local branch at Pawtucket, and a few years later he was made president of the Rhode Island branch, whom he served as Business Agent for several years. In 1909 he became general organizer for the Denver division of the associa-tion, and this year finds him the In-ternational President.
