when there was no opportunity to give it proper consideration. He (Clarke) was sure that it was in his (Dugal's) knowledge that it was the intention of the government that prorogation should have taken place last Friday if possible, but when it became apparent that it would not be possible to prorogue on that day it was confidently anticipated that it might be reached not later than this evening. With that knowledge, knowledge which he must have had, he gave notice of motion for the day, which, under ordinary conditions, was intended to have been the last day of the session.

Further, he desired to say this: that he was authorized by James Kidd Flemming to state boldly and publicly that he denied absolutely every charge contained in the notice of motion, that he did not through the agency of W. H. Berry, chief superintendent of scalars, unlawfully extort from lessees of crown timber lands of the province the sum of \$15 per square mile over and above the amount of the bonus paid by them as set forth in the annual report of the crown land debt. There was not one word of truth in that or in any other charge contained in the resolution, and he would be prepared to show the people the absolute falsity of such charges when the proper tribunal should have been appointed. Behind him he had a body of men who during all the years in which they had known him and had supported him, had found him to be absolutely straight in every detail. They believe that what they have thought to be true all these years is equally true today, and they would show their belief when the proper time came.

As he has already said, the government had decided to adjourn the House until next week and as much as there was not now ample opportunity to take up this matter, he would ask if the hon. leader of the opposition was willing to have his motion go over until next week.

Mr. Dugal said that would be satisfactory to him.

Commodore Stewart and Mr. Swim, who constitute the independent party in the House, contributed good speeches to the debate on the Valley Railway bill and little or no attempt was made to answer their arguments by the government supporters who followed them.

The Valley Railway bill was taken up and was strongly opposed by Messrs. Swim and Stewart and supported by Messrs. Black, Carter, Tilley, Baxter, Grannan, Jones and Lockhart. The bill passed the committee stage with some amendments and the House adjourned until Wednesday evening.
