disorder. These seemed to come from the mob of hoodlums who had gathered from all parts of the city and marched down King street about eight o'clock and across Market Square, holding up the cars from the North End and breaking the windows with stones regardless of the fact that there were passengers in the cars, including women and children.

The police, a few of whom were present at the time, gave such protection as they could to the motormen and conductors of the two cars which were first held up and succeeded in getting them out of the crowd into the Water street lock-up for protection.

## SHORT TIME EXPECTED.

St. Croix Courier:—The future running of the cotton mill, in its working schedule, will probably be guided by the old law of demand and supply as nothing definite is as yet given out. However, the official notice to the employees states that the mill will run full time up to August 2nd, when, if necessary, a notice of the working hours later will be posted. ## THE SPRUCE BUD WORM.

The Bathurst North Light is informed that great devastation has been wrought in the forests near Bathurst by the ravages of the spruce bud worm. On all sides all varieties of trees have been attacked and stripped of every vestige of foliage. One party, a guide, who has just returned from a trip to the head of Nine Mile Brook, says that unless something is done soon to stop the advance of these pests, a very large area of valuable timber land will be destroyed. Reports from other sections of the province indicate that the worm is attacking the trees there also, with the same result.
