The St. Croix mill operated by the same company, was down for a fortnight in June and July and the Montreal mill is down until September.

**ST. JOHN STRIKE  
MAY TAKE TROOPS  
FROM LOCAL STATION**

"H" Company R. C. R. Standing by Awaiting Orders---Major A.C.B. Hamilton-Gray to Command Troops Sent From Halifax

The riots in St. John, which attended the street railway strike, has caused permanent troops to be sent from Halifax. Major A. C. B. Hamilton-Gray, officer commanding No. 3 Infantry Station in this city, has been ordered to St. John to take command of the permanent troops sent there for strike duty. He will probably proceed to St. John by automobile this afternoon.

"H" Company, R.C.R., at noon was standing by awaiting further orders. The men have part of their service dress and equipment on and are to put on the rest when orders to move are received.

Advices received here this morning were that a large number of regular troops were on the way from Halifax to St. John to take up strike duty. The regulars will be used to relieve the militia of duty. Both the 3rd New Brunswick Artillery and the 62nd St. John Fusiliers, the local militia corps of St. John, were under arms at an early hour this morning.

## LATER ORDERS.

Later orders received at No. 3 Infantry Station were to the effect that "H" Company would not be required at St. John and former orders were cancelled.

QUIET IN ST. JOHN TODAY.  
Despatches from St. John early this afternoon were to the effect that all was quiet in the city today, there being no repetition of last night's rioting and violence.
