WELL KNOWN HERE
DIED IN NEW YORK

Percy H. Gregory, Here Last Fall With Young Adams Company Died February 2nd From Effects of Sea-Voyage

Word has been received here of the death in New York City of Percy H. Gregory, who is well known in this city as a member of the Young Adams Company, which played an engagement here, beginning October 13. Percy Gregory, who was but eighteen years of age, was a member of a vaudeville troupe of hoop-rollers which put on a specialty and also doubled with the company in the various plays put on. During his stay in Fredericton he made many friends, who will greatly regret to hear of his untimely death, which took place on Sunday, February 2.

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COLD WAVE

CONTINUES WITH
UNABATED VIGOR

Official Temperature Last Night Was Twenty Degrees Below—Some Glasses Registered Twenty-five Below—High Wind.

The temperature remained almost stationary last night the mercury registering 24 below zero, in some of the privately owned thermometers about the city.

At the Dominion Meteorological Station at the University of New Brunswick the coldest registered was 20 below zero, while at nine o'clock this morning the official temperature was 19 degrees below. The intense cold so far has been accompanied by a strong gale which makes it seem a lot colder than it really is.

The plumber, wood and coal merchants have been the busy men this last week and by the feel of things they will be for some time to come. Reports from other places show that cold weather is general throughout the province, official temperature being as follows:

Grand Falls, 33 below
St. John, 12 below
Moncton, 24 below

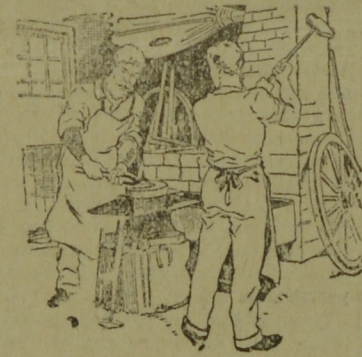
