"To make the assistance of the Empire effective we should put on the Continent and keep there an army of at least one million men. That figure is well within the compass of arrangements now on foot and well within the scope of measures which Lord Kitchener has taken. By the new year we will have an additional

five hundred thousand men ready for the field and by the summer of 1915, we will have twenty-five army corps in fighting shape.
