**MRS. WAKEFIELD'S  
SECOND TRIAL**

New Haven, Conn., July 11—The second trial of Mrs. Bessie Wakefield for the murder of her husband, William O. Wakefield, will begin in the Criminal Superior Court here next Tuesday. At her previous trial Mrs. Wakefield was convicted on first degree murder and sentenced to death.

Mrs. Wakefield's first trial followed that of her accomplice, James Plew, who was executed for the crime on March 4th at the State Prison at Wethersfield. Mrs. Wakefield and Plew were charged with having killed the woman's husband a year ago last June. The Wakefields were living in Bristol at the time. Plew worked on a farm near Waterbury and was a frequent caller at the Wakefield home. The evidence indicated that on a Sunday afternoon when Plew called he started a dispute with Wakefield according to a plan that had been arranged by himself and Mrs. Wakefield beforehand. The woman and Plew then, the evidence showed, chloroformed Wakefield and Plew dragged him from the house and for several miles into the woods, killing him finally by strangulation.

Women's organizations have made a strong fight to save Mrs. Wakefield from the gallows on which she was sentenced to die on the same day that Plew was executed. Her appeal acted as a stay of execution. On April 16 the Supreme Court granted her a new trial on the ground that a part of the evidence given by the coroner at the first trial should have been excluded. Since Mrs. Wakefield's first conviction thousands of protests against her execution have been received by Governor Baldwin from all parts of the country. No woman has died on the gallows in Connecticut for more than one hundred and twenty-five years.

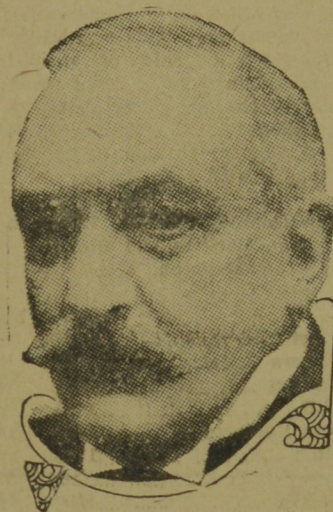

### WHY NOT SPORTS?

It seems to us that one of the best means to encourage general interest in the country as a place to live in is for communities to aid in organizing amateur sport and give the young people a reasonable amount of time in which to make themselves proficient in the particular sport in which they desire to engage. There is a great means of developing not only good physique but first class mental training in meeting opponents on a common ground fairly and squarely, and doing the utmost that lies within one's power to win on a fair basis a game of football, baseball or lacrosse. Many a man owes the measure of self-control which he has in his older life to experiences on the diamond or gridiron. There is plenty of land in the country to provide athletic fields, and there should be sufficient interest taken to insure a number well supplied with the best possible pastimes which amateur sport offers, and where the people know the players, take an interest in the teams, and everything is done on a square and fair basis for the pure "fun of the thing."—Farmer's Advocate.

## NEWS OF FREDERICTON TWENTY-ONE YEARS AGO

**TAKES CONTROL**—Mr. Alex. Gibson is to assume complete control of the Canada Eastern Railway on July 13.

**COURT STENOGRAPHER**—Mr. S. H. Berry has been appointed a special court stenographer under 50th Vic. Chap. 23.

**MUSICAL RECITAL**—A musical recital under the patronage of His Lordship the Bishop of Fredericton, will be given in the Church Hall on next Monday evening by Miss Sharpe and a few of her pupils, assisted by Rev. Dr. Alexander on the piano. Rev. Canon Roberts and Rev. C. W. McCully will give readings, Miss Bailey a violin solo and Misses Babbitt and Bailey a mandolin duet.

**INDUSTRIAL HOME**—The Boys' Industrial Home at St. John was formally opened on Saturday. Sir Leonard Tilley, Hon. A. G. Blair, Hon. George E. Foster, Dr. Stockton Mayor Peters, Sheriff Sturdee and several clergymen were present. Lady Tilley delivered the opening address.

**AMERICAN VISITORS**—Governor Russell of Massachusetts, accompanied by A. H. Swan and Dr. Swan, arrived in the city Wednesday night and registered at the Barker House. They left Thursday morning by special train on the C. E. Railway for Boston, en route to the South-west Miramichi. They expect to be joined in about a fortnight by Joseph Jefferson the celebrated actor.

**MEMORIAL SERVICE**—A special memorial service to the late Bishop Medley was held in the Church Hall Wednesday evening. Bishop Kingston presided and among those on the platform were Archdeacon Brigstocke Rev. J. de Soyres, Canon Forsyth, Sir John C. Allen, Canon Ketchum, Rev. J. Roy Campbell, George E. Fenety, G. A. Schofield and W. M. Jarvis. Mr. Schofield, the treasurer, reported that \$881.71 had been raised to date and subscriptions promised for \$1,781 toward the proposed memorial. Addresses were made by Canon Ketchum, G. E. Fenety, Judge Wilkinson, Judge Fraser and others.
