amount \$35 per m. In the bridge  
the witness gave \$22 per thousand as  
the value of the lumber against \$50  
allowed by Engineer Johnson.

Finally Mr. Carter came to the  
matter of rails. Oh, those second-  
hand rails. The witness testified  
that the rails were bought from the  
C.P.R. second-hand.

"Where is the invoice," said Mr.  
Carter.

Mr. Teed had no invoice. Strange!  
The C.P.R. would hardly sell any-  
thing without supplying an invoice.  
The C.P.R. at least, does business  
according to rule. Mr. Teed could  
give the cost in total but that had  
not what was required. Mr. Teed  
remarked in an aside that it was  
very warm. The proceedings were  
held up in a search for the invoice  
for a few minutes.

Finally the invoice was produced  
and placed in evidence.

Commissioner Pringle—Is there any  
question as to the amount paid on  
those rails?

Mr. Carter—I don't think so.

SOME STARTLING EVIDENCE.

The next witness on the stand was  
Daniel George Kilburn, the engineer  
sent by the department of railways  
and canals at Ottawa to make a  
survey of the railway and supply  
estimates of the cost of the work as  
it stands.

Mr. Kilburn is an engineer of twelve  
years' experience in railway construc-  
tion, maintenance and contracting  
work. He made an accurate survey  
of the road and being examined by  
Commissioner Pringle, gave some  
startling figures which showed that  
the amounts paid for by the govern-  
ment were excessive on almost every  
item in the work.

ITEM CLEARING.

The first item read out by Com-  
missioner Pringle was clearing of  
right-of-way, which was allowed for  
in the certificates of Engineer John-  
son as 72 acres at \$80 an acre.

The survey of Mr. Kilburn showed  
55.2 acres at from \$25 to \$30 per  
acre. The prices given by Engineer  
Kilburn were the prices which he  
considered fair from his knowledge  
of the work. At \$30 per acre he  
found the total cost of clearing to be  
\$1,656. The price paid by Mr.  
Pinder however, to subcontractors  
for this work was \$26 per acre or a  
total of \$1,435.20 against \$5,760 al-  
lowed to Mr. Pinder for the work,  
leaving an excess of \$4,324.80.

EXCAVATION IN WATER.

The item of excavation in water  
for which Mr. Pinder was paid \$11,-  
000 on a basis of 5,500 yards, was  
found by Mr. Kilburn to be a very  
small item arising only at the abut-  
ments on two bridges. He gave an  
outside estimate of 210 yards as the  
amount of it. At \$2 per yard this  
item amounted to \$420 as against  
\$11,000, leaving a discrepancy of  
\$10,520.

LOOSE ROCK AND HARD PAN.

The item of loose rock and hard  
pan was allowed to Mr. Pinder as  
24,000 yards. Mr. Kilburn stated that  
there was no hard pan and the mat-  
ter of loose rock was very trifling.  
The item of overhaul was found to  
be approximately correct at \$750.

TIMBER IN CULVERTS.

Cedar timber in culverts was the  
next item and the accurate measure-  
ments of the witness showed 67,200  
feet at \$45 per thousand, equalling  
\$3,024 as compared with a certified  
measurement of 150,000 feet at \$50  
per thousand, \$6,750, leaving an ex-  
cess of \$3,726. It was shown from  
the testimony of Mr. George Pinder  
that this lumber cost \$27 per thou-  
sand laid down on the work. Mr.  
Kilburn explained that his price of  
\$45 included the building in of the  
lumber.

LOGS IN CRIBS.

The item logs in cribs was put in  
to Mr. Pinder as 50,000 feet at \$35 per  
thousand, total \$1,750. The amount  
by measurement was 23,000 feet at  
\$35, total \$805, excess \$945.

BRIDGE FLOORS.

Timber in bridge floors, allowed to  
Mr. Pinder, 28,000 feet of lumber at  
\$50, total \$1,400, by measurement  
16,976 feet at \$35.

In regard to this item, however, the  
witness explained that a fire and a  
wash-out had made it necessary to  
replace all this material and there-  
fore a double amount of lumber  
would have to be allowed, namely  
34,000 feet at \$35, total \$1,190. Even  
allowing this there was still an ex-  
cess of \$210.

RIPRAP.

Riprap, allowed to Mr. Pinder, 950  
cubic yards at \$2 per yard, total  
\$1,900. Actual survey of riprap, 181  
cubic yards at \$2, total \$362, excess  
\$1,538.


CONCRETE ABUTEMENTS.

Concrete abutments, allowed to Mr.  
Pinder, 620 yards at \$12 per yard  
total \$7,440. By actual survey 347

yards at \$12, total \$4,164, excess  
\$3,276.

STEEL BRIDGES.

Steel bridges, allowed to Mr. Pin-  
der, 348,000 pounds at 5 cents per  
pound, total \$17,400. By actual mea-  
surement, 224,900 pounds at 5 cents  
per pound, total \$11,245, excess \$6,-  
655.

Mr. Kilburn explained also that 5  
cents per pound was the price of  
steel built new into a bridge and  
that this material was bought by  
Mr. Pinder second-hand from the C.  
P.R. Mr. Teed was then asked by  
Commissioner Pringle to produce the  
C.P.R. invoice to show the price  
paid for the steel but he could not  
find the document.

STEEL RAILS.

The rails, fastenings and spikes  
were put in to Mr. Pinder in the  
certified report at \$46,900. This  
item was found to be \$31,366.44, ex-  
cess \$15,533.56.

It was shown that these were sec-  
ond-hand 32 and 56 pound rails  
bought from the C.P.R. at \$25 per  
ton.

COST OF TIES.

Ties were allowed to Mr. Pinder as  
37,500 ties at 40 cents, total \$15,000.  
By survey with allowance of one  
hundred ties per mile for loss and  
breakage, 37,100 ties at 35 cents,  
total \$11,095, excess \$3,905.

Cross examination by Mr. Teed  
brought out the fact that with the  
exception of one siding built by the  
C.P.R., only the common ties were  
used in all the sidings instead of the  
regular ties used for that work.
