ITEM CLEARING.

The first item read out by Commissioner Pringle was clearing of right-of-way, which was allowed for in the certificates of Engineer Johnon as 72 acres at \$80 an acre.

The survey of Mr. Kilburn showed 5.2 acres at from \$25 to \$30 per acre. The prices given by Engineer Kilburn were the prices which he considered fair from his knowledge of the work. At \$30 per acre he found the total cost of clearing to be \$1,656. The price paid by Mr. Pinder however, to subcontractors or this work was \$26 per acre or total of \$1,435.20 against \$5,700 allowed to Mr. Pinder for the work, leaving an excess of \$4,324.80.

EXCAVATION IN WATER.

The item of excavation in water for which Mr. Pinder was paid \$11,-000 on a basis of 5,500 yards, was found by Mr. Kilburn to be a very small item arising only at the abut-ments on two bridges.
