multate a large fortune on a salary of \$2,400 a year. At the first trial it was said that the district attorney had traced some \$70,000 in Becker's accounts scattered in banks all over the city. If Becker takes the stand it will open the way for the state to introduce evidence to prove that Becker had made a business of "shaking down" the gamblers and that it was this which had led to his personal difficulties with Rosenthal. Under the circumstances the district attorney believes that Becker will not dare take the witness chair.

Health inspector at an annual salary of \$700. This is an increase of \$200 Inspector McKay's request for larger salary on the ground of increased duties thus being acceded to. Chas. W. Beckwith was reappointed secretary at an annual salary of \$100. The office of official analyst, held last year by H. H. Hagerman, was left vacant until the next meeting of the board. It is understood that the Water Department is desirous of making the appointment of official analyst and the Board of Health on that account has not filled the office.

Dr. G. C. McCoy was approved as veterinary surgeon for this health district. The board considered a report that the gentlemen's toilet at the I.R.C. station was in an unsanitary condition. The station master is to be notified and Health Inspector McKay is to see that conditions are improved.

## THE BLACK KNIGHT DEAD.

The Rev. J. N. Hector, popularly known as the "Black Knight" and well known in Canada and the United States as a leader in the cause of temperance reform, died recently in the United States. Mr. Hector was a negro, the son of slaves, and had practically no education in his youth. He in turn was a volunteer in the Civil War, a railroad engineer drover and a minister of the African Methodist Episcopal Zion church. He conducted some evangelistic meetings in Fredericton a few years ago and made a good impression. He was seventy years old.
