Billy Murray Tells Funny Yarn About
Coveleskie When He Was Playing
For Philadelphia

Billy Murray, the veteran base ball man, now scout for the Pittsburgh Nationals, has a fund of stories men and incidents connected with baseball that is well nigh inexhaustible.

During a fanning bee in New York the other day one of the base ball writers asked Billy what he thought of Harry Coveleskie of the Detroit pitching staff as a real "come back" and included in his question, "Is he a heady pitcher?"

Murray, who was manager of the Phillies when Coveleskie beat the Giants out of a pennant, told the story and let his questioner draw his own inferences.

"One day when Coveleskie was with the Phillies," said Murray, "there was a man on first and no one out, and he let the runner go down to second without trying to stop him. After the inning was over I very naturally wanted to know his reason for not holding the man to the base."

"Honestly, Mr. Murray, I never knew he was here," was his answer. "Kitty Bransfield began to pan the pitcher, but shut him up and calling Otto Knabe and Eddie Grant, the other basemen, I said: 'Harry, tell me that he never knew there was a man on first. Hereafter I want you three fellows to keep him posted when there's a man around any of your bases. I'm not going to have any secrets in this club.'"

KANSAS CITY FEDS

SUE BLANDING FOR BREACH OF CONTRACT

Injunction to Prevent Him From
Playing for any Other Club---
Allegations Made

St. Louis, April 30—A suit for \$10,000 damages was filed today by the Kansas City Federal League club against Fred Blanding, pitcher with the Cleveland Americans, for alleged breach of contract. An injunction to prevent Blanding from playing with any other club than the Kansas City Federals is sought.

The complaint charges that Blanding signed a three-year contract with Kansas City at an annual salary of \$5,833, of which \$2,500 was paid in advance. Blanding is alleged to have jumped the contract and joined the Cleveland Americans.

Mexico cannot hold out against the United States forces over six months at the outside according to Charles Lawrence manager of oil properties in Mexico, who had just returned from the scene of war, leaving Tampico April 4, and sailing from Vera Cruz April 11.

He says Huerta is the type of man needed to control Mexico and that President Wilson seriously erred in not recognizing him.

"Al long struggle?" Why, it will be like taking candy away from a baby," he said. Suppose the United States warship blockade the ports of Mexico—it would bottle them up completely. They could get no supplies and the country is completely exhausted now for there are no crops this year and there is no money. They have no way of manufacturing gun powder.

"Do you think that the factions fighting each other will unite against the United States?" he was asked.

"I think it very likely to get the whole country up in arms against us. In spirit Mexicans are intensely patriotic. Some of the soldiers are good fighters, but most of them need to feel the point of a bayonet at their backs before they will fight. They are fatalists, however, and once started will put up a stiff fight, for they feel that they might as well die now as tomorrow."

Speaking of Huerta, Mr. Lawrence said: "First of all, don't think of the Mexicans as brute and uneducated. There is a large class of educated people. Many of them have attended the universities abroad and excel in learning many Americans. Eventually, I believe, this class will dominate the country. These are the people who support Huerta and they feel that they have been wronged by the Wilson Administration. And that's exactly the case—we have wronged

BOUT AT CARDIFF FOR BANTAM TITLE

Holders of French and English Titles
Respectively---Have Met Before---
Hughes Lost Both

London, May 1—In a bout advertised as for the world's bantam-weight championship, Charley Ledoux of France and Johnny Hughes of London are to meet for 20 rounds in Cardiff tomorrow. Ledoux has held the French title, but his bouts in England and on the occasion of his visit to America several years ago did not stamp him as a world's champion. Hughes is a veteran of the London ring and stands at the head of his class. The meeting at Cardiff will be the third time that Hughes and Ledoux had faced one another in the ring. In their first bout Hughes lost on a foul in the second round and in the second contest he lost a close decision on points.

Thus the people are prevented from getting a product that they want, and one of Canada's natural industries is being killed. Next season the man who buys maple syrup will be assured that what he gets is maple syrup and nothing more or less, thanks to the action of Mr. Nantel and the support given his maple products bill at Ottawa.

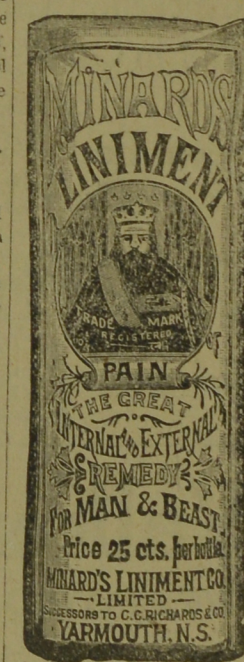
GOOD BAIT.

It seems that one of his acquaintances a traveller of some note sold a small farm to an Irishman and the latter was complaining because there were no birds in his garden.

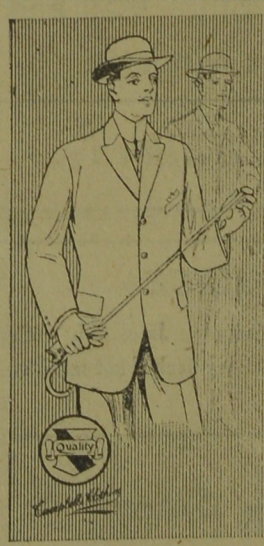
"Set some traps" suggested the traveller, "and they will come."
