### MONTH OF APRIL REMARKABLE FOR COLD AND SNOW

Seventeen and a Half Inches of Snow Fell Last Month—Lowest Temperature was Five Degrees Below Zero

The month of April, which closed yesterday, was remarkable for low temperature and for heavy snowfall, having an average temperature about four degrees below the average for forty-one years and a total precipitation about an inch and a half greater than the average for the same period. The total snowfall for the month was seventeen and a half inches and the lowest temperature five degrees below zero, facts which mark the month as one of the most backward spring months ever experienced in New Brunswick.

Dr. C. C. Jones has furnished the following data prepared from records at the meteorological station at the University of New Brunswick, which compare the weather during April with that of other periods:

Average temperature, 34.6 degrees.  
Average in April, 1913, 42.6 degrees  
Average for forty-one years, 38.4 degrees.  
Highest temperature, 70 degrees, on 19th and 28th.  
Highest in April, 1913, 83 degrees, on 25th.  
Lowest temperature, 5 degrees below, on 3rd.  
Lowest in April, 1913, 15 degrees above, on 8th.  
Rainfall, 2.34 inches.  
Snowfall, 17.5 inches.  
Total precipitation, 4.09 inches.  
Total precipitation in April, 1913, 2.17 inches.  
Average total precipitation for forty-one years, 2.34 inches.

### BOARD OF HEALTH WILL WAIT UPON CITY COUNCIL

Will Press for Erection of Isolation Hospital at Monday Night's Committee Meeting—Salary of Health Inspector Increased \$200

The Board of Health as a committee of the whole, will wait upon the City Council when the latter body meets in committee next Monday night and will press for the erection of a Isolation Hospital as soon as possible. The Board of Health decided upon that action last night when several other items of important business were transacted. Those present were Chairman Wiley, Messrs. Diblee, Shea and Farrell, Health Inspector McKay and Plumbing Inspector Edney.

The Board considered several infractions of the Plumbing Regulations which had been reported and the attention of the plumbing inspector will be called to the matter and he will be instructed to report further infractions to the board. All plumbers are to be furnished with copies of the Plumbing Regulations of the Provincial Board of Health.

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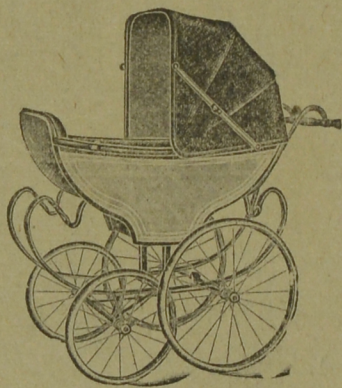
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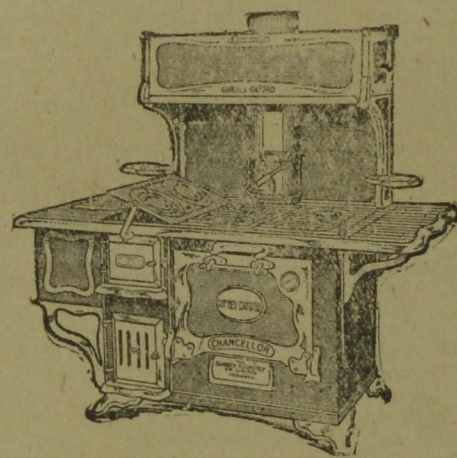
