BAXTER'S BOMBSHELL REFUSED TO EXPLODE

(Continued from page one.)

Mr. Baxter—I beg to inform the
commission of a little more. Refer-
ence has been made to a commit-
tee at Fredericton. There was an-
other committee and I was informed
that committee received a proposal
from the associates of Mr. Carvell,
and endorsed by him to stifle the
inquiry and the payment of \$10,000
was the sum suggested for the con-
sideration.

Chairman—Having said that I think
we ought to know the names of the
gentlemen.

Mr. Carvell—I think so, too. (To
the witness): Who were the gentle-
men?

Witness—I will not tell you.
Q.—I submit I have a right to an
answer. Who were the gentlemen
present at the committee?

A—I will not tell you. You can
find out in another way. I have
read the recantation that was to
be read to the speaker by the Hon.
J. K. Flemming, a document in
which he was to express great peni-
tence for the wrong he had done,
offering to resign his seat for the
county of Carleton and of course the
premiership. In addition to that the
party of which I am a member was to
be permitted to have elections by
acclamation in any county except the
county of Carleton, St. John City
and St. John county. The \$10,000 was
to be compensation for detective ser-
vices by Mr. E. S. Carter and others.
There was still a little more I heard
about it. The timber limit charges
were to proceed, but not with any
great force. It was also reported that
these were the very best terms that
Mr. Carvell could be got to agree to
as he was a very difficult man to get
on with.

Mr. Carvell—Who was the gentle-
man from whom you got that state-
ment?

Ans.—A member of the house.
Q.—Who was it?

A.—I will not tell you.

Q.—I am entitled to an answer. My
name has been brought into this and
I have a right to know by whom.

THE CHAIRMAN'S RULING.

Chairman—The feeling of the com-
mission is that you should reply, but
they will not force you to do so.

Witness—My feeling is that I am
taking the responsibility of making
the secret known. I have divulged it
because of the gross abuse and the per-
versions of justice Mr. Carvell has
made with regard to myself and oth-
ers. I would not be ready to
Q.—You decline to bring in the

name of the parties who brought the
statement to you?

A.—You know the names of the par-
ties. It would not be fair without
their consent, and you are not going
to get me to give the information.

Q.—You refuse to give the name of
the gentleman?

A.—I do.

Q.—And the names of the gentlemen
who were present at the time?

A.—I absolutely refuse.

Mr. Carvell—In view of the state-
ment made, I declare in the most sol-
emn manner, I declare that so far as
any statement concerning myself, it
is absolutely false and without founda-
tion. I want to declare as to the
suggested payment of \$10,000 or any
other amount being made to my associ-
ates I never heard of it and it is
without foundation so far as it refers
to me. I never in my life was ap-
proached by any member of the Con-
servative party or any personal
friend of Mr. Flemming or representa-
tive of his for the purpose of set-
tling these charges. I know nothing of
the drawing up of a document such
as been referred to and in view of
the statements that this man has
made, I say that they are without
foundation where I am concerned, and
I call upon Mr. G. W. Fowler to sub-
stantiate the truth of what I have
said. I am entitled to some protection
from a man of this sort.

MR. FOWLER'S CORROBORATION.

Mr. Fowler—I think it only fair
to say so far as I know representing
the government as counsel here, that
the statement made by Mr. Carvell is
absolutely true. There has been no
such offer made by Mr. Carvell nor
any negotiations carried on by him
(Mr. Carvell) so far as I know, and I
believe the statement made by him
here is absolutely true. I do not know
where my learned friend (Mr. Bax-
ter) has obtained his information but
I say in justice to Mr. Carvell I feel I
should make this statement.

Mr. Carvell—That is satisfactory.
Chairman—Have you any other wit-
nesses, Mr. Carvell?

Mr. Carvell—I have not named Mr.
Flemming, and before I
close I want Mr. Flemming called. I
feel that the books of the St. John &
Quebec Railway ought to be in our
hands before we close this investi-
gation. I am satisfied that if I had
the books of the company here, the ex-
amination of Mr. Flemming might be
unnecessary. The more we discuss it
the more I am convinced of the neces-
sity of having these books here. I think
the commission ought to call Mr.
Flemming on that.

MOBILIZATION ORDERS RECEIVED FROM OTTAWA

Lt. Col. H. F. McLeod Issues Regimental Orders to
Officers Commanding Companies of 71st York
Regt—Medical Examination Begins Tomorrow
Morning

Orders relative to the raising of a
Canadian force for service overseas
were received by Lt. Col. H. F. Mc-
Leod this morning. The orders are
as follows:

Ottawa, Ont., Aug. 6-14.
Lt. Col. H. F. McLeod, O.C., 71st
Regt.,
Fredericton:

Regulations to govern the raising
of a contingent for service overseas
will be as follows: The force will be
imperial and have the status of Brit-
ish regular troops. Enrolment will
be voluntary for all ranks. Physical
qualifications will be as follows:
Horse-train drivers, five feet, three
inches and over; supply and M.T.
branches, five feet, three inches and
over; chest, thirty-three and a half.
The age limit will be eighteen to
forty-five years. In regard to mus-
ketry and general proficiency a high
standard will be required. The term
of service will be for the duration
of the war.

Other considerations being equal
applications will be selected in the
following order:—(a), unmarried men
(b), married men without families,
(c), married men with families. Of-
ficers on the reserve and others with
military experience who, although
not belonging to the active militia,
fulfill the foregoing requirements, are
eligible.

The senior officers of units through
officers commanding companies, etc.,
will collect the names of volunteers,
officers, non-commissioned officers and
men who should be medically exam-
ined by an Army Medical Corps offi-
cer where available. When all the
names have been received, officers
commanding units will submit direct
to militia headquarters descriptive
rolls of those who have passed the

required medical examinations. After
the rolls have been received the quota
to be found by each unit will be de-
termined and commanding officers
will be given instructions as to num-
bers required from their respective
units. The individuality of each unit
will be preserved as far as possible.
Rolls are to be prepared without
delay so as to reach militia head-
quarters not later than Wednesday,
twelfth inst. The intention is to
mobilize a contingent at Valcartier,
P.Q., where, to secure the selection of
the fittest, more men will be assem-
bled than in the first instance will be
required to embark. Acknowledge re-
ceipt by wire.
