BIG ROW IN TORY CAMP

Friends of Deposed Candidate in Carleton Urging him to Stick

Madawaska Tories are also at Loggerheads and are Threatening to Bolt

Woodstock, N. B., May 28—F. C. Squires' forced withdrawal from the government ticket has made chaos in the Tory ranks. His friends, backed by Premier Fleming are urging him to stick. It is rumored today that Leverette White will not accept the place on the ticket. This and other faction fights are making the Tory cause hopeless.

Fleming's suspected connection with the C.P.R. is being emphasized by developments that tend to show a hidden hand is playing the game. All sleepers contracted for by the Valley Railway Company have been turned over to the big corporation and nearly all delivered.

One fare return tickets will be issued on Friday to those attending the big opposition convention at Hartland. The train going north will leave Woodstock at 10.30 affording an opportunity to attend the meeting in the evening at which A. B. Copp and the opposition candidates will speak.

MORE LIBERALS NOMINATED

Rolling Conventions Held in Albert and Gloucester Cos. Tuesday

Excellent Candidates Named to Carry the Standard to Victory on June 20th

Riverside, Albert, May 28—At a largely attended and enthusiastic Liberal convention this afternoon, A. B. Copp, leader of the provincial opposition and William J. Caruath, merchant of Riverside were unanimously nominated to contest the county in the opposition interests at the coming provincial elections.

Every parish in the county was represented at the convention, which despite the busy time of year, was one of the best both from the standpoint of attendance and enthusiasm, held in Albert county in years. The speeches showed that the party is in fighting trim and a victory is assured.

Shortly after the opening of the convention Hon. Mr. Copp arrived and was given a great reception and the applause was deafening as the leader stepped on the platform. Among those who came from Moncton were Hon. H. R. Emmerson who so long and faithfully represented this county; Mayor Robinson, the opposition candidate in Moncton and Ald. Price of Moncton.

Hon. H. R. Emmerson who was given a splendid reception spoke briefly. His telling words were interrupted by round after round of applause. Hon. Mr. Emmerson hit heavily at the present local government which he characterized as having been conceived in deceit and had broken all its pre-election promises and set at defiance the will of the people. He referred to the days of the past and said that if the young men regarded the traditions of their forefathers he would have no fear for the Liberal party in the coming election.

H. H. Tingley, chairman of the nominating committee reported that the choice of the committee was Hon. Mr. Copp and W. J. Caruath. The announcement was greeted with great enthusiasm.

Hon. Mr. Copp spoke very briefly but with much force. He thanked the convention for the nomination but said that he could not accept the nomination today as he must first confer with his colleagues in Westmorland.

LIBERAL TICKET IN GLOUCESTER

Caraquet, N.B. May 28—Sixty-four delegates from every parish in Gloucester county met here today at the call of the Liberal party to select the opposition candidates. The convention was presided by Dr. Turgeon, M.P., Theophile Leger, ex-Warden of the county acted as secretary.

James P. Byrne, S. R. Legg, P. J. Veniot, ex-M.P., were the unanimous choice of the delegates. Joseph Delagrade councillor and teacher of St. Isadore on a ballot being taken with Philippe Degare and John J. Robichaud of Shippegan received the nomination of fourth place, on motion of Mr. Degare seconded by Mr. Robichaud, the nomination was made unanimous. Great enthusiasm prevailed at the convention as the ticket is a very strong one.

Valley Railway Not Going to Grand Falls

Bond Guarantee Floated in London by the Bank of Montreal only Provides for One Hundred and Sixty-seven Miles of Road --Would Cross the Maine Border near River de Chute and Connect with the Gould Electric Road--Where the C.P.R. Will Ring in

Woodstock, May 28—The people of the upper section of the St. John valley are becoming greatly exercised over the increasing evidence of the intention of the Gould company and the Flemming government not to build the Valley road further north than River de Chute, and so omit the Grand Falls section.

Some days ago The Montreal Star published a cablegram from London that the Bank of Montreal was offering on the market the first mortgage four per cent. debentures of the St. John & Quebec Railway Company, guaranteed as to principal and interest by the government of New Brunswick, to the amount of \$287,285 sterling. This is the equivalent in Canadian currency of \$4,214,165.

Dividing this sum by \$25,000, which is the guaranteed bond issue per mile, it gives 169 miles, which is about the distance from Rothesay to the Intercolonial, to a point on the United States' boundary at or near River de Chute.

But the distance from Rothesay to Grand Falls is about 209 miles, or forty miles more than is provided for by the issue of bonds made through the Bank of Montreal.

In other words the bond issue does not provide for building the road beyond River de Chute or some other point short of Andover. No provision is made for building on to Grand Falls. That would mean C.P.R. control ultimately, and no competitive rate for the valley farmers.

What further evidence is needed of the duplicity of the Flemming government? It confirms in the strongest possible manner the charge which the opposition have made, that the Flemming government is simply pretending before the election that the road is to be built to Grand Falls, intending, after the election, to yield to the demands of Mr. Gould and his Canadian Pacific allies that the line shall stop at River de Chute or some point on the American boundary in that vicinity so as to make connection with Mr. Gould's electric railway in Maine in which the Canadian Pacific is also interested. What a gross fraud the local government is attempting to perpetrate against the people of New Brunswick.

CANADIAN PACIFIC STOCK FEATURE OF MARKET

New York, N.Y., May 29—In the early part of the second hour the stock market was heavy, showing no ability to rally after its early decline. Indeed, at about 11.15 a.m., standard issues like Steel, Reading and Union Pacific, which had previously held up well, began to show signs of weakening. Good action was displayed by copper stocks in response to strength of the metal, but it was noteworthy that bulls on this issue, instead of promising immediate advance, were inclined to talk of big upward movement by the fall.

TROUBLE MAY SOON BE OVER

Strike Situation at the London Docks Practically Unchanged

Men Express Themselves as Satisfied with the Report of Sir Edward Clarke

London, May 29—The situation in the London docks is practically unchanged this morning. The work is still, carried on under the protection of the police. No disasters have occurred although the strikers gather in hundreds in the vicinity of the Lockyards, where they jeer and boo at the drivers transporting provisions to the markets under escort of mounted and foot police.

The leaders of the strike movement now say the trouble will soon be brought to an end, as the men express themselves satisfied with the report of Sir Edward Clarke, who after close inquiry found that the trouble was mainly due to failure to carry out the clause in the existing agreement between the employers and the men, providing that differences be referred to the board of trade for decision.

The strikers believe this report will insure their victory at the board of trade conference between representatives of both parties to be held on May 31st with the object of arranging a settlement.

GRAND ORANGE LODGE OPENED THIS AFTERNOON

Many Delegates Arrived Today—Business may be Completed by Thursday

The Grand Orange Lodge of British America opened its annual session at two o'clock this afternoon at the Knights of Pythias Hall, York Street. There was a large influx of visitors to the city today and altogether about five hundred delegates to the Grand Orange Lodge and connected bodies which have held or are holding their session here are in the city. Hon. Dr. Sproule speaker of the Canadian House of Commons, is one of the most distinguished of the delegates. In consequence of the presence of so many visitors the hotels of the city are thronged.

It is possible that the Grand Lodge may be through with its business by Thursday night although in past years the sessions have run over until Friday.

Last night there was a large attendance at the entertainment at Scully's Grove conducted by the local lodge of 'Prentice Boys. The members of the lodge headed by the Fredericton Brass Band paraded to the grove early in the evening.

A LOVING CUP FOR CAPT. ROSTRUM

QUEBEC'S MARRIAGE LAW DISCUSSED AT OTTAWA

Crucial Point Reached in Argument of Counsel in Test Case on Lancaster Bill now before the Supreme Court of Canada---Mr. Migneault, K.C. says Quebec's Marriage Laws have been Misconstrued by Legal Lights---Protection for Children

Ottawa, May 28—What is considered to be the crucial point in the argument of the learned counsel opposing the right of the Dominion parliament to enact the Lancaster marriage bill was reached on the Supreme Court this afternoon when P. B. Migneault, K.C., of Montreal, asserted that the general public misunderstood and many legal lights seemingly deliberately misconstrued the marriage law of the Province of Quebec.

In referring to the fact that under the law in Quebec a marriage is null and no marriage at all, even though the parties contracting lived together a number of years, unless, they being Roman Catholics, of course, it was solemnized by a priest.

"The children are always protected," exclaimed Mr. Migneault, with earnestness. "This point is absolutely misconceived and misconstrued by people who are responsible for the agitation. They have no right to misconstrue the law in this way and impute that the children are thrown on the world as bastards. It is not the law of the Province of Quebec and never was."

By far the most interesting discussion took place this afternoon that has ensued since the hearing started. Mr. Migneault showed his full mastery of the Quebec marriage laws on which he is a recognized authority. All the justices of the court joined in the animated discussion that took place at times, Justices Idington and Duff being particularly anxious to get into the matter deeply and surely.

Mr. Migneault is expected to complete his argument tomorrow, when he will be followed by I. B. Hellmuth, K.C., Toronto, who will take up the matter from another aspect and reply to Hon. Wallace Nesbitt, K.C., who opened the case for the promoters of the bill. Then the two Quebec counsel, R. C. Smith, K.C., and Aime Geoffrin, K.C., are expected to present the case from the side of their province, and later Hon. Mr. Nesbitt and Mr. Lafleur will have an opportunity of replying. It is thought the case will consume the whole week.

Mr. Migneault took up the phase of opposition to marriage in connection with the Quebec laws. "Marriage may be prevented by means of the opposition of the father, mother, tutor or prior consort one of the parties," he said. "In this event, there must be some officer, priest or minister who by legislation is charged with the solemnization. Take the city of Montreal for instance. There are fifty Roman Catholic parishes in that city and about three times as many of other denominations. The law requires to stay a marriage notice must be served on some officer. It is set forth in the act that the articles of marriage must say there is no opposition. This shows the status of the parties. My contention is that there must be some one party with special qualifications to solemnize marriage."

Justice Idington—"In the case of a priest must it be a priest in charge of a church?"

Mr. Migneault—"It must be the parish priest."

Justice Idington—"Suppose a man does not belong to every parish?"

Mr. Migneault—"That is impossible in the Roman Catholic church. Once a Roman Catholic, always a Roman Catholic in the eyes of the church."

Justice Idington—"But if he has no place of residence?"

PRESBYTERIAN SUNDAY SCHOOLS PROSPEROUS

Toronto, May 28—Consistent growth during the past year, by the Presbyterians Sunday Schools of Canada is shown in the annual report to be presented by Rev. J. C. Robertson, general secretary for Sunday Schools at the general assembly, which meets in Edmonton next week.

There are at present 3,329 Presbyterians Sunday schools in the Dominion, an increase of 127 over the number existing a year ago. The officers and teachers number 26,134, an increase of 739, while the number of pupils is 258,821, an increase for the year of 7,603. There are 3,909 teachers a training in increase of 1,835.

THE CONNAUGHTS WARMLY WELCOMED

London, May 29—Their Royal Highnesses, the Duke and Duchess of Connaught and the Princess Patricia were officially welcomed to the forest city today at noon. This afternoon the Duke at Victoria Park officiated at the unveiling of a statue to the London Soldiers, who perished in the South African Campaign. All the regiments in this district paraded as well as local South African Veterans and boy scouts.

An interesting incident of the unveiling was the presence of Private Pinel who was wounded in the Boer war and who has been confined to his room ever since. He was taken to the park in an ambulance. Hospitals and other public institutions were visited by the vice-Regal Party during their stay in the city.

Among the features on the program are successes.
